PLANS UNDER WAY FOR BOY SCOUT EXHIBITION

Plans are rapidly being completed for the Second Boy Scout Exposition to be held in Convention Hall, Detroit, April 21-22 under the sponsorship of the Detroit Council, Boy Scouts of America.

William S. Knudsen, of America's General Motors Corporation is Chairman of the Exposition Committee and Dr. Frank Gody, Superintendent of Schools is Vice-Chairman. It will be the largest activity of its kind ever attempted in Michigan, according to Amos R. Shields, Scout Executive of the Detroit Area Council.

The Exposition will occupy 90,000 square feet of exhibit space and includes more than 130 displays of Boy Scout handicrafts. More than 12,000 Scouts and 2,600 volunteer leaders comprising over 400 Troops in the 40 Communities of the Detroit Area are actively participating in the Exposition.

Variety will be the spice of the Scout exhibits and displays. Both the pre-convocation training and the recreational activities conducted by the Boy Scout organization will be featured. Scouts will splice rope, make baskets, build model airplanes, candle bags and demonstrate many of the 140 pre-convocational activities for which Merit Badges are given.

Some of the subjects to be demonstrated are archery, canoeing, sea scouting, bird study, angling, camping, woodcraft, weather study, aviation and photography. The Scouts will show that, though born and brought up in a city's environment, they can keep busy, that they know modern, dainty methods and can successfully and scientifically raise poultry and at the same time that they are equally capable in adapting themselves to woods and trails with the skill of pioneer foresters.

SCENE OF NEW NOVEL LAID IN OLD SCOTLAND

Readers who remember the shivers that came from reading about the South American jungles so graphically described in "Green Hell" will welcome Julian Degruid's new novel, "Fables Calatrum." From 18th century Scotland, torn with revolt and its consequences, the author brings his characters to Paraguy. An outlaw, a priest, a soldier, and a half-caste girl are the central figures while the background is the steamy jungle of "Green Hell."

The Yearling, by Marjorie Kinman Rawlings. Inhabitants of Florida hinterland are the characters of this novel. Backwoods people, they are sturdy and self-reliant, waging constant war against the encroachments of a semi-tropical forest and the raids of wild beasts. There is humor and wisdom in Penny Baxter, a little man, but a mighty hunter, and his twelve-year-old son, Jody, adore him. Other characters are the boisterous Foresters, quick on the trigger and hasty tempered, who are the villains of the piece. Less important but far more appealing is the Flag, the pet fawn and Old Slewfoot, the bear whose deprecations and cunning furnish much amusement.

The Strongest Son, by Barbara Stevens. When the little boys of Jordan Falls woke out of its sleep for its Tercentenary celebration, the town historian, dusting off old letters and records found some unsuspected stories.

Head in Green Bronze, by Hugh Walpole. A collection of short stories. Told with Walpole's usual skill at creating atmosphere, many of the stories are light or humorous, but some have an undertone of tragedy. Included is the "Hove" series, delightful episodes in the history of a club of young men devoted to the laudable object of painlessly removing insufferable bores from the midst of their friends.

The Promises Men Live By, by Harry Scherman. "A new approach to economics," is the author's own description of his book. Many of the most perplexing of modern economic puzzles he discusses with a clearness of exposition that is refreshing.

So This Is Florida, by Frank Stockbridge and John Perry. A comprehensive survey of the Peninsular state—its history, topography and climate (including hurricanes). Told with a wealth of anecdotes from personal experience, the authors describe the beaches, the orange groves, the

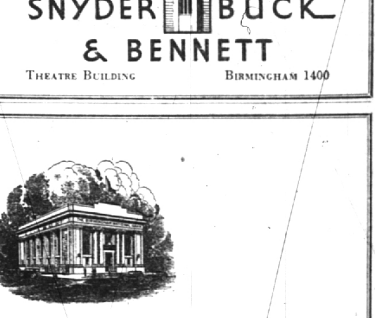
