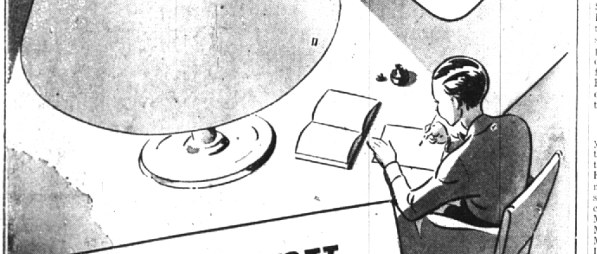

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TWO SPEAKERS APPEAR DURING FEDERATION DAY

Speaking on current important bills before Congress, Miss Eleanor Easton, national organization chairman of the Women's International Peace Officers' Union for Freedom, appeared on the program of the Oakland County Federation of Women's Clubs, which convened for an all-day session on Friday at the Community House.

She predicted that "unless we listen to propaganda designed to make America fearful," there would be no national crisis, explaining that "the navy's defense nullifies all danger of being attacked. She urged the audience to oppose the naval bill, saying "more thought should be given to unemployment and unsuitable living conditions. The naval bill should be left to the hands of a suitable committee, which would ascertain the requirements of the army and navy and then submit their findings to the proper authorities."

Frederick Siedenbarg, executive director of the University of Detroit, spoke at the afternoon session, with "Impressions of the Soviet Union Today" as his topic. He illustrated the address with two films: a propaganda picture, showing "the favorable aspects of the U. S. S. R., and another which revealed it in an unfavorable light. Members of the Holy Junior Club contributed several musical selections, to bring the program to a close.

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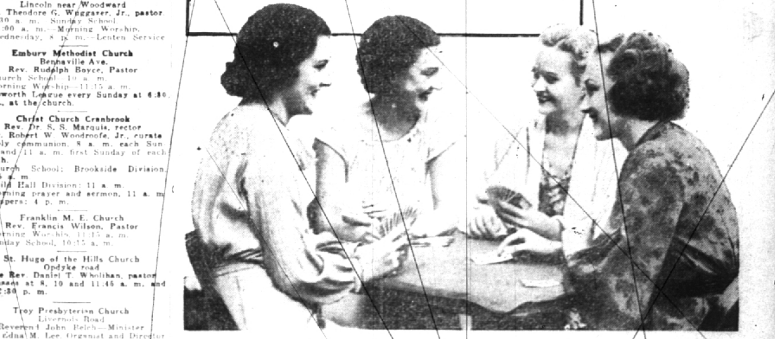
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
