mission that she was interested only in the zoning of her own property, but had been instructed to send her request in, in that form. When Commissioner Arthur J. Kane inquired what she had received the instructions "in" of outside of the Municipal Building, Miss Dewar said she did not care to state, but from a source in which she had confidence.

Commissioner Kane inquired whether it would be possible to rezone only Miss Dewar's property, since no request had been made by the two other adjoining property owners to rezone theirs.

Opinion Differs
Mayor John F. Martz said he believed such a thing could be done. Commissioner Hulbert said that in his opinion it could not be done, as the property had to be considered as an area.

Mr. Gaffil declared he considered it the "duty" of the commission "to stick to the zoning ordinance within all reasonable limits." Commissioner Moody reminded the Commission that when 20 percent of the abutting property owners object to a change, according to the ordinance, and will operate to the fullest extent with all other enforcing agencies.

"Further, I intend to give special attention to the welfare of the youth of this county and particularly in regard to the rapidly increasing use and growth of marijuana."

Mr. Martz declared, "there are many other things to be considered." It was suggested by Commissioner Kane that "in fairness to the petitioners" should be presented again in a different form. On the motion of Commissioner Frank S. Packard, the Commission voted to deny the petition "as presented."
