## Exciting Events Follow 'Strike' At Northwestern As Climax Of Hectic Day

Here is the rest of that last letter I promised to send you. You will recall that when I last wrote to you I related the events of Homecoming Week—the football game, the victory strike, and the dance—all except the evening that followed the strike. I want to tell you of the events that followed that evening.

Undoubtedly a great deal of the excitement was due to the fact that Halliwell's happened on the same night, but let me get on to the exciting climax of the day. After the evening meal, the boys in the house retired to their respective rooms to do their studying for the following day. Everything went on its course smoothly until about eight o'clock. Then the events began their march.

What first broke the silence was a telephone call from another of the houses on campus. The general subject of the call was to the effect that a number of fraternities were going to raid the four houses that had formed a political coalition. Evidently the element of politics is not entirely absent from the N. U. campus, and we happen to have allied ourselves with three other strong houses here. I immediately began to erect my battle line, bringing up fire hoses, all our dearest vegetable matter, and arming buckets and full of water.

A number of sub-contractors on the Municipal Garage and Warehouse project, and seven deductions in the contract price were approved.
