Hymanes, who held the rapt attention of his audience through his 60-minute address, said that he stood before the boys as a challenge to all who engage in it. He said that the boy who wears the badge of his school or college on a field of athletic competition is not merely representing himself; rather, he is the ambassador of his school, his community, the nation.

Gives Illustration

"In this connection I am reminding of the Negro boy who, some years ago, attended Iowa State University," said the speaker. "This boy tried to get on the varsity team during his freshman year, but only received his number. The next year he tried again, and almost got his letter. The same thing happened in his third year—but the last kept on trying. In his fourth year he won a place on the team. But his big opportunity came when Iowa played against Minnesota. Unlucky, however, the lad was injured in that game; the injury resulted in his death."

Back in Iowa, when his teammates were packing up his few belongings to send them to his parents, one boy discovered a slip of paper in a coat pocket. The paper was folded, it was sealed, and the team mate was impelled to read it. And this is what he saw scrawled upon the paper: "Remember Johnny, do your best today—the result of your fate depends upon you."

"That's a challenge to youth that engages in athletic competition," said the speaker, "and it is to every adult in the game of life."

Charles E. Kinnison, president of the Birmingham Board of Education, made a few remarks for his birth in Chicago in 1902, to the present membership of 20,000 Rotarians in 1,513 Clubs, in 80 countries, to the end of the world, and that such a growth was only possible because, within the movement's ideal and program, are universal appeals to mankind's irrepressible desire to be of service and helpfulness to others. "Service," said the Governor, "is merely thoughtful and helpfulness to others."

"Rotary Clubs, as such, are not merely a means of interest in group action achievements, though we do take praiseworthy pride in our work for crippled children. But Rotary's great importance lies in the ability and willingness of individual Rotarians to assume and discharge their responsibilities in their community, business and professional lives. Engaged in these various activities, Rotarians bring to their tasks something of the desire to serve more usefully for others."

An Illustration

As an illustration, Governor Plumb related the case of a Quaker in Peoria, Illinois, whose daughter, one evening, casually remarked: "The Puika boy fainting in school was my father, president of the Quaker Rotary Club, dropped his evening newspaper long enough to ask his daughter a few questions. The next morning he drove out to the poorly-stricken home of that boy and learned that his fainting had come about because of a lack of food. The Rotary Club found an answer to that."

Then this Rotarian learned later from his daughter that "the Puika boy is very fond of music. Another trip to the Puika home and after a short while, the Quaker Rotary Club had financed the youth for piano lessons."

"Today, a few years after the Puika boy fainted in his classroom because of lack of food, he is an able musician, often accompanied by eastern radio and concert programs. Today that boy is supporting his family," concluded Governor Plumb.

The Governor commended president Randall for the activities in which the local Club is engaged, and encouraged them to be continued.

He paid special tribute to J. B. Mowatt, the local Club's secretary for the past 13 years. "He is known and loved all over our 15th District, which includes eastern Michigan and western Ontario," he said.
