

WOMEN'S CLUBS LOAN TREASURES FOR ART EXHIBIT

Art forms in every medium except those of china, and glass loaned and in many cases made by Federation members, comprised the annual art show of the Oklahoma County Federation of Women's Clubs, held Friday at the Community House. The exhibit was part of the group's February meeting.

Mrs. John K. Ormond of Wadlington road read a paper on the "Causes and Cure of War" at the morning session of the meeting, in which members of fourteen different organizations in this vicinity participated.

The session was presented under auspices of the Milford Women's Club, who modeled gowns brought from Europe.

Mrs. Matthews Cammarere of South Adams road displayed a table of embroidery, all done by her. The exhibit included examples of embroidery, cut-work and crochet. Miss Esther and Miss Lucille Purdy also showed lovely crochet and embroidered pieces.

Mrs. Theodore Kaarburg, president of the Birmingham Present Day Club, loaned some Norwegian embroidery for the exhibition. An original painting, the property of Mrs. Edgar A. Parks, was also on display. Miss Richardson entered two of his oil paintings.

Mrs. Jennie E. Tossan of Smith avenue loaned one of the most unusual of the exhibits. It was a quilt, made three years ago, when she was 74 years old. Another quilt was shown by Mrs. Julia K. Lally, Community House hostess. The quilt is 102 years old.
