FINAL PLANS TO CONCLUDE WITH FESTIVE WHIRL

Miss Wilson, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Wilson, will marry Mr. Hargreaves, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Hargreaves, at 8:30 Saturday evening, at the Wilson home, "Longmeadow." The ceremony will be performed by the Rev. W. Hamilton Aulbach.
