

## ADJUSTMENTS OF YOUTH ARE THEME OF TALK

Four major adjustments which the modern child should make before being considered a full-fledged member of society were outlined by Mrs. Bertha Ashby Hess, of the University of Michigan, Tuesday evening in an address to members of the Baldwin High School extension class on guidance and personnel adjustment, sponsored by the University of Michigan.

Mrs. Hess is assistant to Prof. T. Luther Purdom, director of the Bureau of Appointments and Occupational Information for the University of Michigan. She was introduced by Prof. Purdom, who directs the local class.

The four adjustments enumerated by Mrs. Hess include those toward his job, his recreation, people in general, and toward the opposite sex.

Regarding the last point it was brought out by the speaker that the child is too often left to his own devices to secure facts which the parents assume he should know.

"Therefore," explained Mrs. Hess, "It cannot be held against children if they, as they grow older, bitterly blame their parents for such negligence."

In a recently conducted survey among a representative group of school girls Mrs. Hess found the girls' question were due to four principal reasons—ignorance of many facts of life, group codes, parental restrictions, and emotional tension.

The group code of one community might be such that one question might be asked by a large number of girls, while in the same size and type of community would not be referred to, but an entirely different one substituted, Mrs. Hess explained.

"At the age when the emotional tension is increased, the opinions, feelings, and intentions are more affected. It is at such times that effective council and direction should be offered by the parents," the speaker declared.

As an aid to parents who might want advice or ideas on the problems of the adolescent child, Mrs. Hess offered a reading list of books on this subject.

## Woman Explorer Will Address Detroit Town Hall

Mrs. Martin Johnson, famous woman explorer, will come to the Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theatre on Jan. 12, just a year after the plane crash in which her equally well known husband lost his life. Mrs. Johnson will present her new lecture, "Jungles Calling," with the exclusive movies which pack into one program many of the thrilling moments of a career which sent her and her husband to the wildest jungles of the world.

In her 27 years with Martin Johnson, Mrs. Johnson spent only three in civilization. Together they circled the globe six times, exploring the vanishing frontiers in Africa, Australia, India, the South Seas and Borneo. In Africa they established their only permanent home, near Nairobi, Kenya Colony, and started those long safaris first on foot, later by car and at last by air, that left such an exhaustive and unique record of animal and human life and death on the Dark Continent.

## Birmingham Women Discuss Foreign Policy With Congressman G. A. Dondero

Preliminary to the 13th conference on the Cause and Cure of War to be held in Washington, Jan. 18-21, a group of Birmingham women representing four organizations comprising the National Committee, visited Congressman George A. Dondero last Thursday, in Royal Oak. The purpose of the visit was to discuss several points in America's foreign policy in which women's groups are vitally interested.

Included in the group were Mrs. Charles J. Shain, chairman of the

International Relations for the Birmingham Branch of the American Association of University Women; Mrs. John K. Ormond, chairman of International Relations for the Birmingham Council of Educated Church Women; Mrs. Angus D. McVay, president of the Birmingham League of Women Voters; and Mrs. Herbert Z. Reid, chairman of International Relations for the Birmingham Woman's Club as a member of the Michigan Federation of Women's Clubs.

Give Views on War  
An account of the interview with Congressman Dondero, as written by Mrs. Ormond for The Eccentric, is given below:

"Mr. Dondero received the delegation most graciously, and answered questions at considerable length, although he asked that several of the replies be treated confidentially, he gave his permission to report his views on three points.

"In regard to the Ludlow war referendum, Congressman Dondero signed the discharge petition, he said, but is not sure that he is going to vote for the bill if it comes before the House. His point of view was that, while we do not want war, the question arises as to whether it would be wise to try to prevent our participation by a Constitutional amendment, submitting to a popular vote right to decide whether or not war should be declared.

Praises Cordell Hull  
"In regard to the increased appropriations for two additional battleships, Mr. Dondero spoke of the increased importance of the air force in warfare and the terrible destruction they have caused in Spain and China. He suggested that \$120,000,000 could provide a goodly number of planes.

"As to the Administration's handling of the Sino-Japanese situation, Mr. Dondero thinks that everything possible is being done to protect America's interest and prevent our involvement in war.

"As a member of that most important committee on Foreign Affairs, Mr. Dondero has had an opportunity to become familiar with the Administration's Foreign Policy, and though he is of a different political party from the Secretary of State, he spoke in high praise of Cordell Hull and the State Department."

Mrs. Shain and Mrs. Ormond plan to attend the Washington Conference.
