

ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEET MONDAY NIGHT

On Pages four and five of the second section of this issue of The Eccentric you will find a detailed report of the revenue and expenditures of the School District during the past year. A review and report of the year's activities was given at the meeting held at the high school on Monday night.

Charles S. Kinnison, now president of the Board of Education presided at the meeting. Others in attendance were Mark Hardin, J. Harvey Ross, board members; Louis H. Randall, business manager; Howard M. Crull, superintendent, with his secretary; Mrs. Charles J. Shain, and George E. Averill.

One reason for the lack of attendance was that notices of the meeting were not distributed to the three school buildings, due in accordance with the legal requirements.
