The appointment is but one more step in his progress in the fraternity. Besides being the first Birmingham resident to win a national office in the fraternity, Dean and his companions returned from the convention with two trophies; an installation-cup and a transportation cup. The latter award is given to the chapter sending the largest number of delegates the longest distance, and was won for Birmingham's Alpha Omegas with a score of 7,200 miles.
