WASHINGTON LETTER BY SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT AAA Money Flows Toward South; Wallace Puts It Up to Farmers WASHINGTON—The money paid out to farmers by AAA...

Most of the legislation that comes from Washington to "solve" our economic problems, like that which comes from State legislatures, is only a postponement on the part of the Federal Government

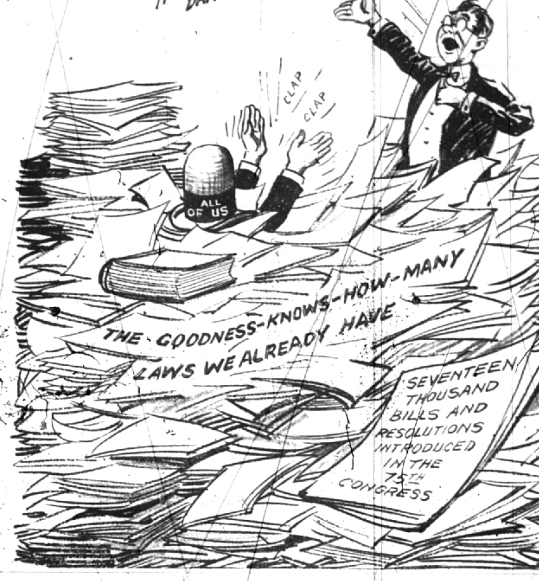

Congressional Comment by Representative George A. Dondero: From time to time my office has issued lists of the WPA projects as approved by the Works Progress Administration. As of July 1, more than \$2,500,000 in WPA allotments for projects in the 17th district have been approved

Oakland county, to reconstruct and improve county-owned roads and streets, \$502,944; to refund recorded amounts in office of Register of Deeds, \$4,123

Plymouth, to install water mains, \$16,300; to improve school yards and adjacent grounds, \$10,000; to construct sanitary and storm sewers, \$40,200; to improve streets, \$27,000

Panama, to construct underground steam tunnel, \$2,300; to improve Oakland schools, \$25,000; to improve park, \$9,250; to construct sewer systems, \$632,777; to conduct real property inventory of all public buildings for care of mental patients, \$19,968

Royal Oak, to improve streets throughout city, \$41,150; to improve water distribution system throughout city, \$18,333; to improve the Detroit Zoological Park, \$18,216

The foregoing list, which totals \$2,527,150, is not intended as a complete enumeration of all WPA projects approved prior to July 1, 1934. These, and other projects, are intended to provide temporary work for the unemployed and the funds to finance the work comes from the taxpayers of the United States regardless of their political affiliations

In the announcement of the various projects, you have no doubt noticed this statement: "No taxes or assessments will be levied to cover the amount of Federal funds expended on this project"
