**Tea Dedicates Camp Studio To Artist**

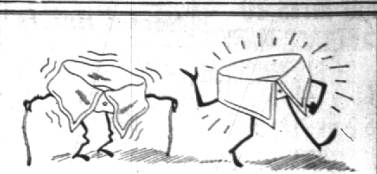

**ZONING HEARING ON VINWOOD HOUSING**

The City Commission has set August 8 as the date for a hearing on the changing of the City zoning ordinance in regard to the proposed multiple-dwelling project on Vinwood avenue, at N. Woodward avenue.

At this hearing residents in the vicinity of this proposed construction will be afforded the opportunity of voicing favorable or unfavorable comment concerning the dwellings.

As the ordinance now stands, it prohibits this type of construction.

That Article 3 of Ordinance No. 221 be amended by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 301 ( ), said Section 301 ( ) to read as follows:

**Section 301**

( ) Property described as part of S W 1/4 of Sec. 25 T 2 N, R 10 E, described as:

Beginning at the S W property corner of Woodward and Vinwood Avenue.

thence westerly along the south line of Vinwood Avenue, a distance of 155 feet.

thence due south to the south property line of Lot 5 Assessor's Plat No. 17.

thence easterly along the south line of Lot 5 Assessor's Plat No. 17 to the west line of Woodward Avenue.

thence northwest along the west property line of Woodward Avenue to the point of beginning.

is hereby included in "Multiple Family Residence District."

Note:—This involves property at Woodward and Vinwood.
