The Pageant of "Our Street"

(In which Dr. Dunning, for the past 32 years pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, of Kalamazoo, and Alma College, reveals his head and heart about things intimate to people in their neighborhood lives. Dr. Dunning has often been referred to as "Kalamazoo's No. 1 citizen.")

I live on Lovell street in Kalamazoo. It is a good street in a good town. Twenty-one years ago I bought a home there. The city put a number on it and I put on a mortgage on it. The house was all new and shiny then. It was not yet a home. "It takes a heap 'o' livin' in a house to make it home."

Then, the street was an old-fashioned street in an old-fashioned town. Shade trees and lawns and gardens, not much traffic and lots of room. Last summer they widened the street and cut down many of the trees. It is busy and bustling now, full of traffic and of trade. Still zoned as a residence street, the country aspect has disappeared.

We who live there love it just the same. It is a typical American street. The life we live there is the same as the life we live in other streets. Most of the houses are of an extra shabby and poor lot of folk rapidly disappearing from the earth. We have telephones and electric lights and radios and iceless refrigerators and gas stoves. Most of us have a car, more or less paid for. The men have two suits and an extra shirt and pair of shoes. We are infinitely better off than our fathers were in spite of depression and taxes.

It is, after all, the people who make a street. Fine feathers do not make fine birds. We think we are every bit as well off as the swells up on the avenue. We are average people. Most of us come from pioneer stock. We have a good inheritance of which at times we are very, very careless.

Some of us get up earlier than others and walk to our work. We are not so sure about that. We are in the factories. Times have been hard for us of this group. But we are not so sure about that. We are not so sure about that. We are not so sure about that.

Along about 8:30 in the morning, our street is filled with those of us who wear white collars instead of blue shirts—clerks, tradesmen, teachers, professional men, executives who manage the complex affairs of Main Street.

Some of us in this group have been having desperately hard times of late. I met a merchant the other morning who said, "My business has all gone to pot. He looked as the Italians used to describe Dante." "He is the man who has seen hell." This man has been clear through hell, these past few months. But he has not lost his soul nor his sense of humor. He will pull through.

We have a great many children on our street. Every once in a while a baby is born, and every body is glad. It does something to the heart of the father and mother. They are full of life and energy and promise. We look to them to undo many of the mistakes of this older generation made in the social order. Maybe, out of one of our homes in Lincoln or in our own nation. We have great hopes in our children.

Then, there are the shut-in people. Some of them have finished their work, but not their usefulness. From their radiant souls, their busy neighbors catch a bit of inspiration, as we think of their achievements, their victories over adversity, their present calm outlook on the future.

Of course, everything is not so good as it seems. There are lonely people there. A city can be about the loneliest place in the world. The boarding house, the loneliest place in the city. I wonder if we all who have homes, are as thoughtful as we might be for that working girl I met yesterday who lives all alone and goes right by our houses every day.

There are unhappy people on our street. The other morning I met one of my neighbors, a fine, upstanding business man. He has been looking sad of late, and I have wondered about it. He is an other race than mine. Then, I remembered that someone had thrown a paper on my porch that contained an scurrilous article about his people. It was a reflection of the vain, vulgar, pagan spirit that is so accented today. I wonder if my neighbor had read this attack on his race, who are just as good as Americans as the American of us. Perhaps that is what makes him so sad.

There is a street a wonderful pageant is forever passing. The people who used to live there, some have moved to other cities and some to the city beyond the stars. "But their worlds do follow them." Their spirits move up and down Lovell Street, and Memory peoples it again with their faces as they pass.

Looking out of my window I see a continual procession of people going by in automobiles. I count one hundred and twenty cars the other night, in twenty minutes. Who are these people and where are they going? Ever since the world took to wheels a few years ago, there have been more and
