INDUSTRY OF ANT NO FABLE, M. S. C. WARNS HOUSEWIFE

It's no fable that an ant is industrious. So a timely warning to Michigan housewives is sounded by Professor E. I. McDaniel of Michigan State College, who sees no reason for housewives to be plagued if a few precautions are taken with the food supply.

The graduate school description of how ants still follow the findings of scouts is still gospel, says Professor McDaniel. Control of the foragers, however, is to forestall their work by several means.

Dry poison bait is easy to prepare. Make use of the ants' liking for brown sugar. But sprinkle the bait with sugar particles.

One ounce of the poison is sufficient to mix with one pound of the bait. The bait is not available until the ants disappear. If the sugar gets wet the bait loses its effectiveness.

Last week-end we journeyed nearly 500 miles to Ironwood for an annual meeting of the Upper Peninsula Development bureau.

From the 200-mile trek was only half of our mileage. The distance from Detroit to Ironwood is greater than from Detroit to New York City.

At the Ironwood round up we heard emphatic statements on every hand of the practical necessity of a span at the Straits.
