These new marks were established by six boys on the Maple team who were entered in just the four events.
The first record to fall was the 880-yard relay. The team, composed of Casey, Andrews, O'Donnell, and O'Donnell, circled the track twice in the record time of 1:35.8, breaking by a second last year the mark the team set at the meet, which was 1:36.1.
Next to go was the time for the mile medley relay. The 880 relay team, led by Bradford replacing O'Donnell, ran this event in the new time of 3:42.5. This cut 5.7 seconds off the former record of 3:48.2, which was also made by Birmingham in 1937.
Track Captain Frank McCarthy was the last of the six on the Bald team, and he set a new Class B high in the high jump, by crossing the bar at 5 feet 11 inches. 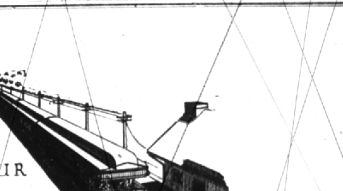
