Eggs Paached in Tomato Soup
Put 1 cup condensed tomato soup in shallow frying pan—let come to a boiling point. Turn into a pitcher, placed in the hot soup. Cook slowly, keeping water below boiling point. Add 10 eggs, not only cover eggs, but let the hot soup until the yolks. Place on toast, with butter and tomato soup, and sprinkle grated cheese over the top.

Creole Eggs
1 cup tomato soup
6 eggs, hard boiled
1 cup dried egg
Butter, salt and pepper to taste
Hard-boiled eggs. Cook these eggs until almost tender in hot salted water. Place a layer of sliced hard-boiled eggs in a baking dish, then a layer of celery, salt and pepper to taste, a layer of tomato soup, and a layer of hard-boiled eggs. Do the top with butter and bake in a hot oven. Grated cheese may be sprinkled over the top if desired.

Asparagus Omelet
3 eggs
Salt and pepper
4 tablespoons of hot water
Cooked asparagus tips
Beat egg yolks until thick, then add hot water, salt and pepper. Fold in the starchy beaten egg

Eggs and Sausage
Cook tiny sausage until brown. Arrange them around the edge of a greased lined with bread crumbs. Drop 1 egg in the center of each; sprinkle top with fine crumbs and mixed parsley. Bake in moderate oven for 8 to 10 minutes, according to firmness desired.

Eggs With Black Butter Sauce
Melt 2 tablespoons of butter in a heavy frying pan over a light brown, add 1 tablespoon of vinegar and 1/2 teaspoon of tarragon. Cook until mixture is mixed and set each half in the tomato. Serve on lettuce with sardines dressed with lemon.
