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Takes New Post

George A. Tomlinson

George A. Tomlinson, Great Lakes vessel operator, of Cleveland, O., and former Michigan newspaper reporter and managing editor, has been elected chairman of the Board of the Erie Marquette Railroad, subsidiary of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway.

This marks the fourth railroad board chairmanship to which Tomlinson has been elected. He resigned recently as chairman of the Missouri Pacific, subsidiary of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway.

In addition to his Erie Marquette post, Mr. Tomlinson is president of the Allegheny Corporation, railroad holding company.

Born at Lagret, Mich., Jan. 25, 1876, Tomlinson has lived a many-sided, adventurous career, starting as a cowboy on a Wyoming ranch after his expulsion from the Loper high school as the "Peck's bad boy" of the school.

Catching the greys fever during an appearance of "Buffalo Bill" and his troupe at Detroit, Tomlinson trained a job with the show as cowboy performer and stunt rider. But he soon tired of circus life and went to work under Dana on the New York Sun. Later, he became managing editor on the Detroit Times, a Scripps newspaper.

In 1912, Tomlinson went into business as a vessel agent at Duluth. In 1914 he began operating a vessel of his own in the Lake service. This was the nucleus of the present Tomlinson Fleet, in which he is president. The Fleet comprises sixteen boats.

Fortnight in speech and manner Tomlinson is disarmingly frank regarding himself and his business activities. The door to his office in the Central Tower, Cleveland, is never closed to callers. His wife is the former Laura Davidson, daughter of the late Captain James Davidson, shipbuilder of Bay City, Mich.

"T-Pi-Tin"—A Composer's Holiday

MARIA GREVER, Latin American, pianist and composer of song, used the musical traditions of a score of years when early this year she strayed from the standards to write her first popular song. She had created nearly five hundred standard songs, many composed for individual stars of the concert stage, when she evolved the light gay number, "T-Pi-Tin."

Now "T-Pi-Tin" is Maria Grever what the Prelude to Rachmaninoff, or the Minuet to Padewski, are to the composer and his personality. She likes to dream of the recent past when she was hailed as composer and artist of the concert stage, before she discovered that she also had the touch of a popular songwriter. And at Rachmaninoff envisions heaven as a place where his friend never heard she can picture her paradise as a region not ringing with the rhythm of "T-Pi-Tin."

Maria Grever never regarded "T-Pi-Tin" as more than a passing fancy, and reluctantly consented to its publication early in the year when friends who heard it in her studio pressed her to give its gay melody and biting wry to the world of popular music lovers. Raymond Leven, A.S.C.A.P., wrote the English lyrics.

Maria Grever's career in song has been international. A native of Mexico City, she was reared in Spain. Returning to her native land, master of piano, violin and guitar, she sang with a velvety coloratura soprano. Her patriotic family frowned upon her theatrical aspirations. Married at fourteen, she found her husband in sympathy with her ambitions for a career in music, chance recording one of her first compositions, "Besame" (Kiss Me) brought her recognition. When "Jarame" (Promised) followed, her fame was secure. Soon she was a reigning favorite of Latin America's concert stage, where for
