Take The 'Dog Days' In Your Stride And Plan Cool Meals Around Salad

Salad and warm weather just naturally seem to go together. In early days it was made of herbs and leafy vegetables. Today, we make salad from almost any appetizing combination of foods and serve it as a first course, as a main course at luncheon or frequently as a dessert. The materials for it must be the newest and freshest of the season; emphasize contrasts in flavor, texture and color. The salad plates should be chilled, also the lettuce and other garnishes; and any dressing that may accompany the salad should be cold.

Vegetable Salad
1/2 cup cooked diced carrots
1 cup cooked peas
1/2 cup cooked butter beans
1 cup diced celery
2 tablespoons minced chives
1 cup cold salad dressing
6 large tomatoes
1 green pepper
6 anchovy fillets
Curly endive or lettuce
Combine the carrots, peas, butter beans, celery, chives and salad dressing. Peel and scoop out the chilled tomatoes and sprinkle with salt. Fill with the vegetable mixture and each with strips of green pepper and a fillet of anchovy. Arrange on individual beds of curly endive or lettuce.

Frozen Cheese Salad
1 cup evaporated milk
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 packages cream cheese
1 cup chopped dates
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 cup crushed pineapple
Scald the evaporated milk over hot water and chill and whip. Add lemon juice to the whipped milk and beat very stiff. Cream the cheese until soft, add the mayonnaise and mix thoroughly. Fold in the whipped milk with the dates and pineapple. Turn into a freezing tray and freeze very quickly. Serve on lettuce or watercress.

Vegetable Bouquet Salad
Place your preferred mixture of vegetables in a lettuce nest. Top with cooked cauliflower. Circle with cooked carrots sliced cut in stars, surround with peas. Lastly have a circle of tomato sections or diced beets. With a sprig of parsley in the center of the cauliflower, you have an old-fashioned bouquet.

Jellied Cheese and Beet Relish
Salad
1 pkg. lemon flavored gelatin
2 packages cream cheese
1 cup cooked chopped beets
1 cup chopped raw cabbage
1 tablespoon minced onion
Lettuce
Sliced cucumber
Mayonnaise
Prepare the gelatin according to directions on the package. Divide in half. Chill in the refrigerator until it begins to thicken. Into one half beat the cream cheese.

Salmon Salad
1 lb. can of salmon
4 chopped, shelled, hard-boiled eggs
1 1-oz. jar caviar
4 tablespoons chopped pickle relish
1 cup mayonnaise
Lettuce
Stuffed olives
Combine the salmon, eggs, caviar, pickle relish and mayonnaise. Arrange on individual beds of lettuce and top each salad with a slice of stuffed olive.

Cottage Cheese and Peach Salad
1 lb. cottage cheese
Lettuce
6 tablespoons honey
6 halves of fresh peaches
Arrange 1/2 cup of cheese on each of 6 individual beds of lettuce. Pour 1 tablespoon of honey over each. Garnish with the peach halves cut in two.

Chicken Fruit Salad
2 cups diced cooked chicken
1/2 cup pitted white cherries
1/2 cup diced canned pineapple
1 pared orange sliced
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 cup French dressing
Lettuce—watercress
Combine the chicken and the fruits, nuts and French dressing. Serve on individual beds of chilled lettuce and garnish with watercress.

Emerald Salad
Border individual plates with green lettuce leaves, slice green peppers as wafters and chill in ice water. Drain, dry and arrange on the lettuce with minute shreds of onion, top with sprigs of watercress. Serve with French dressing made red with shredded pimento.
