The League of Women Voters is not what the humorist, Don Marquis, used to describe as a little group of "serious Thinkers," Mrs. Smith said.

"One of the oldest activities of the League is the conduct of non-partisan candidates' meetings before the Detroit Board of Education. The League is non-partisan. It does not, as an organization, affiliate with any party, political or religious organization, sponsor any candidate or concern itself with the campaign activities of candidates."

The financial views and opinions of the candidates were overshadowed by the basic fundamentals of education. If religion, morality and ethics are to be taught in the schools, we must first have a good system of education.

"If I hesitate to offer my services as a candidate for the School District my conscience would worry me, that is, who would have failed to bring my message to the public and to carry on for the sake of the community and taxpayers."

"For the past few years there has been a change in membership on the Board of Education," Mrs. Dale said.

"We are dealing with the largest body of Birmingham voters, the possible exception of the City itself. Your investment in land and labor is at stake. It is imperative that you own a debt of \$120,000. The number of employees exceeds 400 with an annual payroll of over \$160,000. The city has made a total expenditure of about \$240,000 annual income is part of the story."
