CHURCH PLANS SERMON SERIES DURING LENT

Midweek Lenten Services will be conducted at Redeemer EV. Lutheran Church, on Lincoln near Woodward, every Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock during the season of Lent, March 2 to April 6.

The general theme for the series is "The Enemies of Christ Speak." Weekly topics are, beginning March 2, and on the 9th, 16th, 23rd, 30th, respectively: "The Death of One or Many"; "This Fellow was also with Jesus"; "What is Truth"; "Guiltily or not Guilty"; "He Trusted in God; Let Him Deliver Him Now"; and on "His Blood be upon us and upon our children."

FIVE BALDWIN MUSICIANS IN SOLO FESTIVAL

Five of the eight Baldwin High School entrants in the Southeastern Michigan Band and Orchestra Solo Festival held all day Saturday in the Dearborn (Mich.) High School, made a rating of "Good" or better, it was announced Monday by Arnold W. Berndt, director of the Birmingham band and orchestra.

A "superior" rating was given to Harold Jones, who played the trumpet, and to Jack Melling for his skill on the clarinet. Mary Craig, Bob Navin, and Gordon Erik, who play the French horn, flauto, and piano respectively were rated as "Excellent."

It is my belief that those students from Baldwin who failed to get such a high rating, received lower marks not because of their inefficiency on their instruments, but because they were not used to playing before a judge and critical audience such as the judges, and therefore were nervous.

In this Solo Festival the participants do not compete with one another. Each is rated against perfection on his instrument and his piece. The five classifications are: Superior, Excellent, Good, Average, and Poor.
