

BOARD ACTS ON PLANS FOR NEW CINDER TRACK

Further plans for constructing a cinder running track nearly one-quarter mile long on Pierce Field, were discussed Monday evening at a special meeting of the Board of Education. As a result, the Board decided to submit the project as a proposal to the WPA office in Pontiac.

The plan was recently submitted to the Board by Harry E. Beisford, of 212 Pilgrim road. If WPA, it would be financed independent of school bond funds, the Board further decided by Mr. Beisford, provides for a cinder running track approximately one-quarter mile long, with a connecting straight away section for sprints, and special pits for the high jump, long jump and pole vault. The track would occupy the central position in the athletic field. To accomplish this, it would be necessary to move the football field about 27 feet eastward, placing the middle of the track, the grandstand would also be moved to the westward position, and the entrance gates would be changed to give access to the field from the street. The track would be according to specifications prepared by Mr. Beisford, 14 feet wide, and built with a depth of 18 inches.

The entire plan as submitted by Mr. Beisford has been approved by Charles Hoyt, track coach at the University of Michigan. Plans for financing the project have been under consideration by a committee composed of William A. Dukes, and Charles S. Kimball. The Board is unanimously agreed that the funds of the school district are to be used for this project. Mr. Beisford has been authorized to proceed with the project, and to explain the project to the faculty members of Baldwin, Adams and Hamon High Schools, to determine whether the school district is to undertake a large share of the responsibility of raising the necessary funds.

It is the hope of the committee and the Board that this might become a major undertaking of the school district, and in raising the money.

The committee has received assistance in the form of a gift of 20 yards of embers from the executive office of the Michigan Industrial Plant.
