Her report emphasized the part played by young persons at the Congress. "On the platform," she said, "I met the young people of Columbia. They had been selected by the committee to represent the organization with the D. A. R. State Boards, on a basis of dependability, service, loyalty and patriotism" to Washington. At the Congress also were 230 other delegates, representing the Children of the American Revolution.

Mrs. Harris quoted the address made by President Roosevelt, when he said: "I am particularly proud that you are making this appeal to the young people of America. We look for a younger generation that is going to be more American than we are. We are doing the best we can, but we must do better than that." The words were enthusiastically applauded.

She stated the report also included an account of the reception given at the White House by Mrs. Roosevelt for the delegates.

Mrs. Harris addressed the business meeting, which was followed by luncheon. The attractiveness of the dining room, the early American setting was augmented by bowls of lilacs on the luncheon table, and lavender tapers in silver candlesticks. An afternoon of bridge concluded the day's activities.
