

COMMISSION VOTES 'NO' ON ZONING

(Continued from Page 1, Part 1) The Commission to determine whether or not the property had been zoned for its "logical and proper use."

Mayor John E. Martz read a letter from S. C. Hadley in which Mr. Hadley stated his company in no way opposed the project. Mr. Hart replied to Mayor Martz, as Birmingham manager for S. C. Hadley's company, he felt called upon to say that in his opinion Mr. Hadley did not own "a foot of land in Birmingham."

Petitions Contradictory "This is all very confusing," Mayor Martz declared. "Two weeks ago we were handed a petition with signatures in black and white of property owners who desired a change in the Zoning Ordinance. These same people are here tonight opposing the change they want on record as favoring. Some influence has changed their minds in this short time."

"The spirit of the Zoning Ordinance in Birmingham is to favor single homes. We can not permit ourselves to assume anybody's property in violation of this spirit. Before this property was zoned, anything could be built, as it is now, the front can be used for multiple dwellings, and the back for single homes. Woodward avenue is not only a business thoroughfare in Birmingham, it is the Main Street for the State of Michigan. Those who purchased homes as close to Woodward avenue as some of these may have to be flexible."

A final pool of the Commission defeated zoning of the property. Mayor Martz and Commissioner Ray Palmer voted in favor of rezoning, and Commissioners Luther Hancock, W. E. Moody, Lawrence Hubbert, and Frank S. Packard opposed it. Commissioner Arthur Kane was absent.

FIGURES REVEAL CITY'S SHARE OF SCHOOL TAX LEVY

(Continued from Page 1, Part 1) Collected in 1937, \$1,151,511.47. The latter municipality refunded \$1,151,511.47. The total amount collected for 1937-38 was \$1,151,511.47. The amount levied for 1937-38 was \$1,151,511.47.

Township returned \$2,149.64, the report shows. In this township the amount levied for operating is given as \$2,352.00, and that of the debt levy as \$2,008.40. For this township, the total in uncollected taxes amounts to \$11,040.15.

Summarizing, the statement discloses that in the two cities and three townships included in the investigation, the total levy was \$224,749.12. The total collected for 1937-38 was \$23,791.52, and for debt, \$27,501.17, or a total of \$51,292.69, representing the amount collected. Against this is set the total amount of uncollected taxes, amounting to \$11,040.15. In the entire district, the percentage of taxes collected is 22.82.
