**Be Prepared For The Cherry Season With Some New And Appealing Recipes**

Cherries have long been a welcomed fruit both fresh and candied. Everyone loves the flavor of a luscious cherry pie with flaky crust and juicy filling, but for variety try some of the following recipes of red and white cherries:

**Cherry Fruit Cup**  
1 cup canned cherries  
1 cup sliced peaches  
8 mint candies  
1 cup crushed pineapple  
1/2 cup diced grapefruit  
2 cup cherry juice

Drain the fruit from the juice and chill. Dissolve the mints in the cherry juice and chill. Then thoroughly arrange the fruit in shallow glasses and pour juice over the fruit.

**Cherry Surprise**  
1 package cherry flavored gelatin  
2 cups liquid  
1 cup cherry  
2 bananas sliced  
1/2 cup nuts

Add enough water to the inner of the can of cherries to make a pint. Heat to the boiling point and dissolve the gelatin in it. Chill. When slightly thickened, add berries and bananas. Pour into mold. Chill. When ready to serve, unmold and serve with whipped cream.

**Cherry Lemonade**  
2 cups stemmed cherry juice  
1 cup lemon juice  
1 cup sugar

Mix 1/2 cup of the sugar in 1/2 cup of water and boiling 3 minutes. Combine all the ingredients and pour over cracked ice.

**Cherry Pie**  
1 quart cherry stemmed  
1 cup sugar  
4 tablespoons flour  
2 tablespoons butter

Line a pie pan with pastry. Blend sugar and flour, mix thoroughly and add the cherries. Fill pie pan. Dot with butter, press edges together and flute. Bake in 350 degree oven for 40 minutes. Cool and cut into slices.

**Cherry Sandwiches**  
Cream 1 cup of butter with 1/2 cup of brown sugar, gradually fold in the yolk of 1 egg and 2 cups of sifted flour. Stir and knead thoroughly until the mass is soft.

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
