

MAROONS DOWN TWO PITCHERS IN HAZEL PARK GAME

Although they had only one day of practice last week, the Maroons walloped two Hazel Park pitchers here Friday for 19 hits to defeat them 12 to 7. "Lefty" Grambeau pitched for Birmingham and allowed eight hits, eight bases on balls, hit two batters and struck out seven.

In the first half of the first inning the Maroons failed to score. Green opened with a single to center but was left stranded as first as Grambeau fled to Sunoy and Hunter popped to Irwin.

Hazel Park went into the lead in its half of the first. McAdam, first up, was hit in the hip by a pitched ball, but was picked off first on a fine throw by Snyder. Miriani was safe on Jones's error but out stealing. Snyder scored. Bedard, Hart walked. Slusher then hit a fast grounder to Hunter who threw the ball over Jones' head. Hart going to third and Slusher going to second on the error. Sunoy singled to center scoring Hart, but Slusher was out going to third. Upward to Hunter.

The Maroons went into the lead in the third when they scored two runs. After Wenzell had struck out swinging, Green singled to left. Upward singled sending Green to third. Grambeau singled to right, scoring Green and Upward, and took second on the throw to the plate. Hunter grounded to Knapp and was out at first. Grambeau going to third. Hunter came through with a single to center scoring Upward and Grambeau. He then stole second. Snyder fled to Naas in deep left. Bedard lined to Wiler who dropped the ball. Hunter scoring. Bedard going to third. Jones fled to Wiler and Bedard scored after the catch. Follis popped to Miriani.

Hazel Park failed to score in the fifth. The Maroons picked up two more runs in the sixth. After Wenzell fled to Naas, Green was safe when Hart failed to pick up his fast grounder. Upward slammed a long double to left sending Green to third and both came home when Grambeau singled to right. Hunter banged one to Hart who threw to McAdam forcing Grambeau, Bogie being safe on the fielder's choice. Snyder ended the rally popping to Hart.

Hazel Park failed to score in the sixth. Bedard opened the seventh on Miriani's error. Jones singled to center, Bedard going to third. Follis fled to Sunoy. Bedard scoring after the catch and Jones going to second. Wenzell singled to center scoring Jones and took second on the throw to the plate. Green singled to center sending Wenzell to third, and he took second on the throw-in. Wenzell scored and Green took third on a wild pitch. Adams was then sent in to pitch for Hazel Park and he promptly struck out Upward, but Grambeau singled to right scoring Green. Hunter singled to left, sending Grambeau to third, but Snyder struck out ending the rally.

Hazel Park scored two runs in the last of the seventh but that wasn't enough and the Maroons proved the victor, the final score being:
