(Continued from Page 1, Part 1) One of the most outstanding features of the opening will be the exhibition of 16 paintings by the famous artist and naturalist, Francis I. Jaques, who is ranked one of the three great painters of birds in America. The exhibit which will start Saturday will remain at the Institute until June 11, and will be shown in the Penthouse. It will be open to the public.

Mr. Jaques is a member of the staff of the American Museum of Natural History in New York. His work has been exhibited in the National Academy, and is famous for his interpretation of "the bird in the landscape" theme. He is particularly interested in wild fowl, and in pursuit of his art, has traveled all over the world from South Sea Islands to the Arctic, from the Bahamas to the Matterhorn in Switzerland.

The exhibition of Mr. Jaques' paintings includes 13, with three of the Cranbrook Institute. One is privately owned, and one belonging to the University of Michigan. The Cranbrook Institute is located on "Elders Off Shore," "Snow Geese," "Ducks and Bullheads," "The Great Lakes," "Bald Eagles," "Mallards" and others.
