the exact figures are impossible to obtain through the statistics. These figures do not include "borderline" cases, families who are barely self supporting and who simply cannot meet the expenses of any emergencies, such as illness. We have about 125 such cases at present."
Plan for Centralization
Mrs. Lally defined more centralized action among social service agencies as the most important need today among the city's workers. She said, "The three service clubs in Birmingham are a great help with their dental and eye clinics, and their work with crippled children. A large share of relief work is done by the churches and still more by the Parent Teacher Associations. The sincere wish through that in the future, Birmingham's social service, welfare and charitable agencies will combine even more fully, to form one bureau for the administration of all relief, and to make for more effective use of time and money."

Six Percent For Savings
For the former, \$2.00 or six percent of the income should be set aside for saving, the speaker said. Other items in this budget provide for \$8.00 or five percent for insurance, \$35 or 24 percent for food, \$38 or 25 percent for rent, \$25 or 16 percent for clothing, \$20 or 13 percent for operating expenses, and \$15 or 10 percent for advancement.
In "operating expenses," the speaker included maintenance items such as heat, light, telephone, laundry, and under "advancement," he listed donations to the church, to the Y, to the Red Cross, to the city, and to the library.
