OCTOBER FISHING DECLARED BEST OF ENTIRE YEAR

LANSING, Oct. 6.—If you are a fisherman, you know that the best time to go fishing is in the fall.

The lower temperatures which come during this month in a normal season stimulate the fish in the fishery world. The same fish which, like humans, are inclined to eat and sleep more during the heat of the summer get renewed pep as the water cools.

In general, October usually offers the best angling because it offers temperatures which are neither too warm, as they frequently are in the summer, nor too cold, as they are likely to be in the winter.

Bas fishing often is the most productive, but catches of pickerel, bluegill and perch also are usually heavier in October than earlier in the season.

PULITZER WINNER AMONG NEW BOOKS IN PUBLIC LIBRARY

A Pulitzer prize winning work dealing with the reconstruction of the North and South and three books of rather diversified interest are a part of new books acquired during the past week by the Baldwin Public Library.

"The Road to Reunion" by Paul H. Pask is a modern and interesting approach to the reconciliation of the North and the South.

This work deals with the period from 1865, when the North and South were split wide apart, to 1915, when the two sections were again nationally harmonious.

Dr. Buck speaks freely of the years during which the effect of the Civil War on the North was evident. He also writes of the Southern youth who were growing up during the eighties; the passing of the Negro problem and finally of the economic integration and the two sections.

The distinction between this book and others of the period seems to be that the author does not let all its stress on the economic adjustment. Rather, it interprets the background of the period.

Mr. Du Fay has told the story simply and well in a manner which will appeal to the lay reader. The book is a readable and interesting account of the life of a man who has done much for the world.

For those with model railroads who are hobbyists, a book by Raymond C. Taylor, "Model Railroads and Operating Model Railroads," will be of special interest.

The book covers the whole subject of model railroading. From the ready-made equipment so popular with young boys to the more complicated and scientific type.

Those who have already taken up model railroading as a hobby will find in the book valuable advice in as much as the author writes from years of experience.

The twentieth book of the new series "Making a Poster" by Alexander Todman. The first book in the series is included among the new works acquired by the library.
