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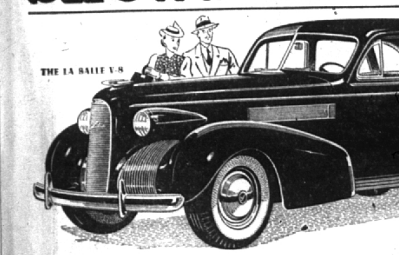

That charming idiom "a Piggy" Gilpin, London society darling, was at the Brookside auditorium Friday evening, when the St. Dunstan's Guild, in three of Noel Coward's most popular plays from "Tonight at 8.30." But who cared for reason, while rollicking comedy and character study opened another season for the "Piggy" Gilpin was brought to life by Mack Elton (Mrs. C. J.) Winningham, in one of the most charming of her many characterizations for the Guild. She was supported by a mildly insane cast which included Ferd M.
