Polygon Club Lives Up To Its Name With Many-Sided Activity Program

Polygon Club members try, as their name suggests, to be many-sided in their outlook. On Friday evenings at 7:30 o'clock these young people meet at the First Presbyterian Church and combine religious discussion and social activity in their efforts to be alert, broad-minded and sociable in a word.

Formed in response to a need, long felt among the members, for some organization devoted to those young people between high school and college age, the Polygon Club held its initial meeting on Oct. 1, 1937.

For an hour after they arrive at the church on Friday evenings, the Polygoners are busy playing shuffle-board or ping-pong or volleyball. At 8:30 they lay aside their respective cues and rackets and balls to assemble in the balcony room where Paul L. Penfield, of Lake Park drive, leads a discussion group.

"Looking Forward to Marriage," was the title of the discussion outline followed last year, and the club must have taken the subject to heart judging by the number of recently married members.

"Ten Authorities Other Than God" is the discussion which Mr. Penfield is leading this year. Edward F. Ouellette wrote the outline which the club is following. By skillful arrangement of facts and questions, the author explores ten secular sovereignties pressing upon young people today and turning their minds away from religion. The discussions are informal, with everyone taking part spontaneously.

Social activity occupies the club again after the discussion group is finished. That ever welcome program feature, refreshments, is in charge of a volunteer host and hostess, or sometimes two hosts or two hostesses. Little tables are set to and to end in the recreation hall, and with only soft candle flames to light the room, the young people eat and talk.

"We continue the evening's discussion for a while, but by the time refreshments are finished, we usually have touched upon many other interesting subjects," said Mrs. John Joseph Murphy, who was Martha Stoll, what she presided over the club last year. Apparently taking the marriage discussion quite seriously, she became the bride of John Joseph Murphy during the summer.

"After the refreshments which are supposed to end at 11:00 o'clock, but which usually last until midnight, five or six of us stay and help the host and hostess wash the dishes," Mrs. Murphy continued. "The discussions are always interesting and educational. We

COACH TO SPEAK ON PROGRAM FOR ADAMS P. T. A.

"Strong Bodies and Able Minds" is the title which the next speaker to appear before the Adams P. T. A. Parent Teacher Association has chosen for his address. John Johnstone, assistant director of intra-mural athletics at the University of Michigan, will address the group on Monday, Nov. 7, at its second meeting of the year.

The speaker's history so far as his work is concerned, dates from the time he was appointed to attend a non-commissioned officers' physical training school in the British Navy at the age of 18. Afterwards, he became a physical director in the Navy. He left England afterwards, to do physical education work at Calumet. During the war he became a commissioned officer in the British Navy.

Since his return to America, Mr. Johnstone has been in charge of physical education work in the Pontiac public schools, Y. M. C. A. secretary and a boys' club director. He was the high school coach of the famed George Gyp.

Also appearing on the program will be a trio of members of the Pierce School Association, Mrs. James Danrell, Mrs. L. L. Nixon and Mrs. Fred Cruise. They will present a short playlet, illustrating the problems of a membership committee for the Association.
