## Entertain Hallow'en Folk With Appropriately Designed Dainties

Hallow'en is right around the corner and probably someone in every community is planning now to entertain on this night of peering madness and mysterious haunting into the future. Refreshments must be the occasion; it may be a real old fashioned one of doughnuts, gingerbread, pumpkin pie, coffee, cranberry apples, nuts and popcorn. If you prefer it may be as modern as you like. Tiny menu cards of black paper written in white may be used with the following menu:

- Sarcophagus Surprise—Fruit Salad**
- Fried Butterflies—Potato chips**
- Sand Witches—Sandwiches.** May be served with a filling of orange marmalade, also a chicken salad sandwich.
- Pumpkin Dainties—Orange ice**
- Satan's Delight—Fudge Squares**
- Witches Brew—Coffee.**
- Witches' Treasure Chest**
- 3 cups flaked canned red salmon.
- 2 cups chopped nut meats.
- ½ cup chopped pickles.
- 2 teaspoon lemon juice.
- About 1 cup mayonnaise.
- 1 loaf bread, unliced.
- Cream butter.
- Hard boiled eggs and pimento.
- Combine salmon, nut meats, pickles, lemon juice and mayonnaise, using enough mayonnaise to thoroughly moisten. Remove crust from bread and cut into 4 lengthwise slices. Butter each generously, being careful to butter inside of top slice. Spread the mixture on slices with salmon mixture and top with remaining slice, trim and wrap in waxed paper or a dampened napkin. Chill thoroughly and serving time garnish with sliced hard boiled egg, lemon slices and quarter inch bands of pimento. Cut into slices for serving.
- Hallow'en Cup**
- 1 No. 2 can of figs.
- 3 lemons.
- 2 oranges.
- 1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple.
- 1 No. 2 can orange juice.
- Guava and mint jelly.
- Arrange the pineapple and figs in cocktail glasses. To the fig and pineapple syrup add the lemon and orange juice. Pour over the fruit. Garnish on top with tiny cubes of guava and mint jelly.
- Cider Frappe**
- 1 cup sugar.
- 2 cups water.
- 4 cups sweet cider.
- 2 cups orange juice.
- Juice of 2 lemons.
- Mint cherries.
- Boil water and sugar together for 5 minutes, add sliced oranges and lemon juice. Strain and when cold, freeze to a mush. Serve as a first course in sherbet cups, garnishing with mint cherries.
- Jack O'Lantern Salad**
- Hollow'en and apples or oranges. Cut Jack O'Lantern halves in the upper and place bits of pimento, green pepper or celery in the opening. Fill the apple with a nice fruit salad and top with a mayonnaise made stiff enough to stand like a cap on the fruit.
- Spiced Tea**
- ½ cup tea leaves.
- 2 cups sugar.
- 1 teaspoon each of nutmeg, allspice and cinnamon, tied in a bag.
- 10 cups boiling water.
- ½ cup lemon juice.
- ½ cup orange juice.
- Boil over stove and cold water for 10 minutes; put in tea leaves which have been tied in a bag and the boiling water, orange juice and lemon juice. Let steep until cold.
- Crystallized rose or violet leaves.

Notice is hereby given that a General Election will be held in the City Office Building, East Long Lake Road, City of Bloomfield Hills, County of Oakland and State of Michigan, on TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1938 for the purpose of electing the following officers:

**NATIONAL AND STATE:**

Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Representative in Congress, State Senator, Representative in State Legislature.

**COUNTY:**

Judge of Probate, (to fill vacancy), Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Circuit Court Commissioners, Drain Commissioner, Common Pleas Judge.

The following proposed amendments to the Constitution will also be submitted at this election:

**NO. 1.**

Amendment to Sections 3 and 5 of Article VIII of the Constitution relative to extending the term of office of Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer and Register of Deeds to four years.

**NO. 2.**

Amendment to Section 2 of Article VII of the Constitution providing for the appointment of Justices of the Supreme Court.

**NO. 3.**

Amendment to Article X of the Constitution by adding Section twenty-two relative to providing the diversion of highway revenues.

**NO. 4.**

Question of the adoption or rejection of Act No. 257 of the Public Acts of 1937. (Transfer of the administration of certain existing state public welfare and relief matters, services and duties to the State Department of Public Assistance created by said act.)
