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REGISTRATION NOTICE

Residents of the City of BIRMINGHAM FOR GENERAL ELECTION Tuesday, November 8, 1938

To vote at this election, all persons must be registered in the City by Wednesday, October 19, 1938, at 8 p. m., Eastern Standard Time.

Citizens of the United States, 21 years old, who have resided in the State of Michigan six months and in the City of Birmingham twenty days at the time of voting are eligible.

TO REGISTER, call at the City Clerk's office in the Municipal Building on or before Wednesday, October 19th, during business hours. The City Clerk's office will be open on Wednesday, October 19th, until 8 p. m., Eastern Standard Time.

Any registered elector who has moved since he last voted, may cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the clerk a signed request stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer at any time before Wednesday, October 19th. Any person who has not voted since November, 1934, and who has not re-instated his registration, must re-register by October 19th.
