Frank Percival Price, Dominion carillonist at the Peace Tower in the Parliament building in Ottawa will present the first of a series of special guest artist carillon recitals Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock at the Burton Memorial Tower in Ann Arbor according to an announcement made this week.

Mr. Price received his musical training in Canada and in Europe. He obtained his diploma from the Mecklin Carillon School in 1922, the first carillonist from outside of Europe to receive this distinction. He was awarded his bachelor of music degree at the University of Toronto in 1928 and in 1934 was named the Pulitzer prize winner in music.

Mr. Price, who has given recitals as guest carillonist throughout Europe and North America, was appointed carillonist at the Massey Memorial carillon in Toronto in 1922; at the Rockefeller Memorial in New York in 1925; and at the Peace Tower in Ottawa in 1927.
