The program, after it had been turned over to the Scouts by Mrs. Harris, opened with a prayer by the chapter chaplain, Mrs. L. E. Biggert. The Scouts recited the Girl Scouts Laws while standing at attention, after which they joined in singing "America." The business meeting was then held.
Outline Objectives
Three objectives of the D. A. R. were outlined at the beginning of the conference according to the delegates. These objectives are to finish paying for laundry equipment at the D. A. R.-conducted Tomesee School; to increase acreage in the D. A. R. memorial forest; to finish furnishing the Michigan War Memorial Hall in Washington, D. C.
Outstanding speakers were heard during the second day of the conference. Among them were Roy Goetz, 14-year-old Detroit boy, who delivered his prize-winning speech, "Stars in Our Lives," Robert Berstecker, who spoke on "The Wolverine Boys' State," a project of the American Legion, to give boys an opportunity to learn government by practice; and Mack Williams of New York, whose address was entitled "Youth Trains Itself for Democracy." Mrs. Harris and the Regent also reported on chapter activities during the afternoon.
Honor Local Chapter
Piety Hill chapter received honorable mention for its photostatic reports of old Bibles, which has made three during the past year. Honors also came to the local group in the form of three letters of increased membership in the state.
