National Honors Are Awarded To Cranbrook 'Crane'

Robert Whittlesey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew B. Whittlesey of East Hickory Grove road and editor of The Crane, Cranbrook School newspaper, guided the publication to national honors it was learned this week. A first place in the private school division of high school newspapers has been awarded to The Crane by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association, which entertained 2,000 high school editors in New York recently.

The award was shared by six other private school papers throughout the country. First place winners follow directly behind the medalist, or topmost division. Among the honors won by the Cranbrook paper as a result of the rating was the reproduction of one of the issues in The New York Times.

Other schools whose papers ranked with The Crane are St. Mary's, Choate and Horace Mann, all of New York; Lawrence of New Jersey, Sacred Heart of New Orleans and St. Albans of Washington, D. C. Six school papers were given the medalist rating.

The publications were judged on format, content and general excellence, with special emphasis on editorials, features etc.

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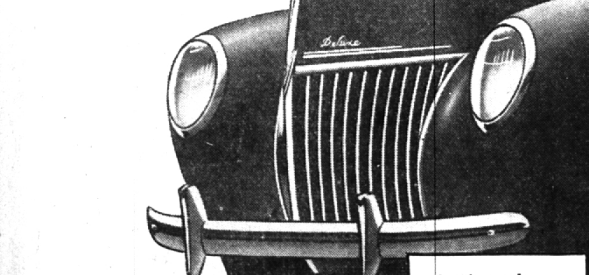
