'They Knew Him Not' Is Theme of Sunday Sermon

"Burning Hearts" was the title of the sermon delivered in the United Presbyterian church Sunday by the Rev. Joseph A. Meares. Rev. Meares related the story of the disciples who walked with Christ without recognizing Him, and compared it with the present lack of recognition of Christian principles. Rev. Meares said:

In Luke 24:16 we read the words: "was not our heart burning within us, while He spake to us, and we were hindered to understand the Scriptures?"

Two of the disciples were walking along the dusty highway from Jerusalem to the small village of Emmaus, about a two-hour journey. They were despondent and blue, dejected and disappointed, downhearted and sad. All the disciples were. These two were talking about the recent events which had taken place in the city of Jerusalem.

Expected to arrive had there should be even one person in Jerusalem at that time who did not know what had transpired, they related briefly the story of the crucifixion of the Lord Jesus and concluded with a very weak presentation of the resurrection. Giving the impression that they more than half-way doubted the truth of what some of their own number had actually reported to have seen, they barked that stranger as they finished speaking.

About Your Public School

This information is furnished by the Birmingham Board of Education in cooperation with The Eccentric.

Q—Is there a difference between the school census and school membership? If so, what is this difference?

A—Yes, there is a difference between school census and school membership. The school census is defined by law and includes all persons within a school district between the ages of five and nineteen years inclusive. The law defines when the school census shall be taken and reads as follows:

"There shall be taken in each school district of this state a school census during the last twenty days of May."

The census figures for each school district is the basis for distribution of the state primary interest fund which is money received annually by school districts for the support of the public schools.

Membership is the actual number of pupils enrolled at any given time in a school system and is a constantly changing figure depending upon the number of pupils enrolling and leaving the system.

The school census for our district as of May 1938, was 3228 persons. The school membership on Friday, April 21st, was 2666.

Surplus Food Saved From Scrap Heap to Feed Hungry



FROM good food, which might have gone to waste, from other scrapped material, Columbus, O., is keeping hundreds of people from hunger, providing useful occupations for many more.

The project has worked so well that its leader, Fred Hertel, 64-year-old retired insurance man, has been named honorary food conservator by the city.

Known as the food and goods conservation project, the plan has started about the same time as the sponsorship of the Columbus Elks lodge.

Hertel had learned that tons of surplus fruits and vegetables were being destroyed at the markets. "No sale" items, most of which were still in good condition, were being consistently routed to the rubbish heap. Other food was discarded simply because it was undressed.

Today, Hertel, in his delivery car, makes regular trips to commission houses. Discarded products are culled over the still fresh fruits and vegetables are sorted out and cleaned.

Then Hertel puts the food into boxes and baskets, which he piles onto the automobile, and distributes to his regular relief clients, charity hospitals, settlement houses, orphan homes, and schools in poor neighborhoods.

Not only food, but many useful materials are saved from the garbage can or incinerator.
