### There Are Dozens Of Different Dishes Which 'Pep Up' Your Cooking Routine

- Do you serve the same things week after week? Has your cooking got in a rut? If the answer is yes, then you had better start looking through your cook books for something new. A simple yet different menu perfectly prepared and charmingly served will take the monotony out of cooking and will make the family feel proud of its house-keeper.
- Spaghetti Crabmeat Ring**
- 1 8-oz. package spaghetti  
1 egg, beaten  
1 cup canned, button mushrooms  
1/4 cup milk  
1-2 green pepper finely minced  
2 tablespoons minced onion  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup grated American cheese  
Cook the spaghetti in boiling salted water until tender, drain and mix with remaining ingredients and mix well. Bake in a well greased ring mold in an oven 350 degrees for one hour or until firm. Unmold and fill the center with crabmeat, made by adding a large amount of cream, flaked, to 3 cups of well seasoned white sauce.
- Omelet with Shad Roe**
- Beat 6 egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add 3-4 teaspoon of salt and a dash of pepper. Then add 1/2 tablespoons of water, a tablespoon at a time, beating after each addition. Beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry, and fold them into the egg mixture. Melt 2 tablespoons of butter or other fat in a large skillet. When hot, pour in the egg mixture. Cook slowly for 12 minutes. Then set the omelet in an oven 300 degrees until the top no longer adheres to the fingers when touched. This should cook about 5 minutes. During this time the shad roe should be sauteed in a little fat. If you use fresh shad roe it's best to cook it ahead of time so that it will be ready to saute as the omelet is cooking. When omelet is done, make an incision on either side, perpendicular to the handle, so that it will fold easier. Cover half the surface with the shad roe which has been crumbled into small pieces. Fold over and slide on a hot platter and serve with additional shad roe. Garnish with cream and wedges of lemon.
- Apple Cream Pie**
- 5/8 cup of apple, whipped  
1 cup apple sauce, chilled.  
Sugar  
2 cake layers  
Nutmeg  
Whip cream and fold into apple sauce and sweeten to taste. Spread between and on top of layers. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Chill 1/2 hour before serving.
- Baked Pork Chops Creole**
- 2 loin or shoulder pork chops  
Salt and pepper  
1 tablespoon fat  
1/2 cup of rice  
2 cups boiling water  
2 chives, finely minced  
2 rings of green pepper  
2 slices of onion  
Flour  
Wipe the chops with a damp cloth, sprinkle with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Brown chops in fat. Place them in a deep casserole that has a tight-fitting cover. Wash, drain and cook the rice 5 minutes in salted boiling water. Place a slice of tomato, a ring of pepper and a slice of onion on each pork chop. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Put the rice and salted water around the chops. Cover and bake in a moderate oven for about one hour. If the rice should cook too dry, add a little more water.
- Shrimp and Corn Pudding**
- 2 tablespoons fat  
1/2 cup of shrimp, chopped  
2 green pepper  
1 peeled small onion  
1 cup canned or cooked fresh shrimp  
Celery salt  
1 cup whole grain corn  
1 chopped canned pimiento  
1 teaspoon salt  
Pepper  
3 eggs, beaten  
2 cups milk  
Melt the fat in a saucepan. Add the green pepper and onion and cook slowly for 5 minutes. Remove the black vein running down the back of the shrimp, then add the shrimp and remaining ingredients to the fat. Form into a greased baking dish. Set in a pan of warm water and bake in an oven 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours or until set when tested with a silver knife.
- Lime Pie**
- 1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1 tablespoon melted butter  
2 tablespoons vinegar  
Line a pie plate with pastry. Beat the eggs, add the sugar and butter; then the vinegar. Pour into pastry-lined plate and bake.
- Blackberry Pudding**
- 2 cups flour—1 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs—1/2 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons melted butter  
1 pint of blackberries  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
Heat berries and sugar until they can be strained. Beat the eggs, add melted butter and blackberry juice. Add the flour. Pour into a mold and boil one hour. When ready to serve, unmold and slice. Serve with butter sauce and a touch of cinnamon in it.

A black wool suit with lingerie blouse is smart but many of the blacks are combined with colors, particularly shades of pink.
