 ment will continue until 9 p. m., Thursday.

Three services at St. Hugo's will be held on Good Friday from 12 noon to 3 p. m. Father Alexander M. of Holy Trinity College, will officiate, accompanied by a special choir, which will render "The Seven Last Words" by Dulon.

Special services will be held at Holy Name Catholic Church on last afternoon and evening of Good Friday, according to the Rev. Fr. James W. Cotter.

Three-hour sessions at St. James' church will also be held from noon to three p. m. The Rev. Warner L. Forst, pastor, will deliver meditations on the themes "The Seven Last Words." There will be prayers and hymns by the congregation. At eight o'clock in the evening, the choir of 25 voices will present "The Crucifixion," by Sir John Stainer, under the direction of Walter E. Fellows. Incidental solos will be sung by Mrs. S. H. Fox, soprano; Mrs. E. S. Kinney, contralto; Charles Hutton, baritone; and Mr. Fellows, tenor. God Parish and Misses will play the organ. The subject is "The Crucifixion."

Easter Even Devotions
 will be administered at St. James'. An evening prayer service will be held at 7 p. m.

The annual Three Hour service at Christ Church Cranbrook will be held from 12 noon to 3 p. m. Good Friday. The service will consist of three addresses by the Rev. Thomas L. Harris, music by the choir from Bach's "St. Matthew's Passion," and prayers and congregational hymns.

Christ Church Cranbrook will hold its annual sunrise service at seven o'clock on Easter Sunday morning. Holy Communion will be celebrated and there will be music by the full choir.

Children's Hour
 The Resurrection Festival, at nine a. m., is a brief service for children and their parents. There will be a story, the traditional pageant, and music by the Boy's Choir, and the Red and Blue Chorus. A fresh-cut flower, symbolizing life growing out of the tomb, will be given to each child. At 11 a. m. there will be another celebration of the Holy Communion, an Easter sermon and special music. Easter Vespers, at four p. m., will be largely musical.

At seven o'clock on Easter morning, Holy Communion will be celebrated at St. James' Church. The full choir will sing "They Have Taken My Land Away," by Scudder, as the offertory hymn, with incidental solos by Mrs. Kinney and Mr. Fellows.

The children's service, at 9:45 a. m., will have music by two choirs, one composed of small children, and the other of girls from the junior and senior Church Schools. It has long been the practice to present each child at the service with a flowering plant, typifying the spiritual side of Easter. Mrs. John H. Gordon is superintendent of the kindergarten and primary schools while Mrs. Har-

Special Music
 At the 11 a. m. service, the St. James congregation will join in a celebration of The Holy Eucharist. The choir will sing: "Awake, Thou That Sleepest," by Stainer. Mr. Forst will speak on: "What the Resurrection Brought to the World." All of the services are open to the public and visitors are welcome.
 Two sunrise services will be held at the First Methodist Church. One, under the auspices of the Epworth League, will be a pilgrimage to an out-door sanctuary. One, under the auspices of the Epworth League, will be held and breakfast will be served. Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Brown, counsellors of the young people will be in charge. The affair will start at 7 a. m.

Youth Breakfast

Parents and friends are invited to attend the Departmental Services of the Church School, to be held at 9:45 a. m.

Morning worship will begin at 11 o'clock. The Pastor will preach on the subject "Great News for a Troubled World." A music program has been arranged by Mrs. Ulrich, director of choir. At the evening service, to be held in Wesley Hall, the church annex, the Epworth League will stage a pageant. Parents, friends and the general public will be welcome.

On Easter Sunday, the solemn High Mass will be celebrated at 10 a. m., at St. Hugo's. There will be a special musical program. High Masses will be held at eight, 11:45 and 12:30.

First Communion
 Members of the Confirmation class at Redeemer Lutheran Church will receive their first Communion at the Easter Morning Service, at 11 o'clock. The choir will sing "The Lord Hath Triumphed," by Harris. The Rev. Waggner has chosen as his theme: "The Stone Is Rolled Away." Two services of worship will be held on Easter Morning at the First Presbyterian Church, at 9 and 11 o'clock. The Pastor's theme is: "The Resurrection Reminiscent." The sacrament of infant baptism will be given at the latter service.

In both services, the choir will present selections from the works of Haydn, Thomson, Thiemann and LeJeune. Children in and above the junior department are invited to attend the first service, which replaces their Church School program.

A Sunrise Service at 8 a. m. will begin the Easter services at the First Baptist Church. Special music and talks by the young people will be followed by breakfast. Officers and teachers of the Church school program, at 10 a. m., will be inaugurated.

 "Then Came Jesus" is the sermon theme for the 11 o'clock worship, at which Rev. Nelson will preach. The Girls' Chorus will sing "Dawns the New Day," by Holton and the Senior Church Choir will present Harry Rowe Shelley's cantata, "Death and Life."
 A special service of baptism will follow the sermon at the 7:30 evening worship. The topic is "The Great Decision." Music by the Girls' Chorus will include "Man of Sorrow," "Gethsemane," and "The Resurrection and the Life," all by Holton. The community is invited to attend all services.
