A special award donated by Henry Foster was based on points obtained from blue ribbons, was also won by the Hills exhibitors. Mr. Foster's gift, a projector for this use, was won on the excellence of the mantles and tables in Divisions One and Three.

Three special blue ribbon awards were given to three Bloomfield mothers who exhibited points each in Division One. Mrs. H. W. Peters and Mrs. Marshall Fredericks, for modern mantles, and Mrs. Honora Scoville, for French mantles, were the winners. Others, whose mantle exhibits took ribbons were Mrs. James G. Gaudin, blue, French; Mrs. Donald Sanderson, blue, modern; and Mrs. Louis Kahn, modern, red. Three exhibitors of the popular Italian mantles won the following ribbons: Mrs. Harry W.
