Despite the fact that Coach Franklin Whitney walked off the floor with high scoring honors tucked snugly in his pocket, the Baldwin High School varsity cage team, after a hard-fought battle, won a 53-31 score in the Baldwin gym on Thursday in a game with the faculty.

Led by Lerne MacDonald, who crumbled a second place in the scoring column by virtue of his seven field goals and two charity tosses, the varsity lads seized the lead in the opening minutes and did not relinquish it throughout the game.

Leading 15-0 at the end of the first quarter, the boys never slackened the pace, and surely not too slowly, they pulled out in front by a 30-16 count at the half.

The teachers fought desperately in the last stanza and managed to gain a little. But due to the lack of substitutes, the tugging pace wore them down. They began to grow careless and committed six fouls in the remaining six minutes, accounting for six of the varsity's 17 points in this period.

As the closing minutes crept up, the faculty men looked very tired but connected for four field goals and two free throws in as many tries, equalling their second period performance of ten points.

In a preliminary game the reserves, led by Howard Crull, downed a team composed of junior high school substitutes from Adams, Baldwin and Barnum, the final score being 24-15.

Roland Langeman handled the referee's post and "Turkey" Neff and Bill Merrill took charge of the timekeeping.

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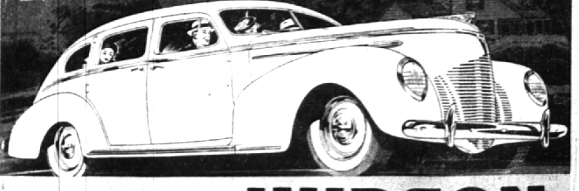
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
