Com. House Open Again Sept. 5th

After a most successful year, the Birmingham Community House closed last Tuesday, August 1st, and will be re-opened September 5th, during which time the House will be cleaned and portions of the interior painted and some upholstery work completed.

However, the employment office will remain open six days a week, from 8:30 a. m. until noon. The visiting nurse will receive calls from the Municipal building where the telephone number is 1320. Not until sometime in October will the Thrift Shop be opened, when it will be under the management of the Junior League.

According to Mrs. Julia K. Lally, Director of the Community House, welfare requests have decreased in the last two months and the number of persons using the employment office has increased.

Through June, the number of meetings by organizations in the city have held up more than is customary for that period in the year. Contributions to the House, as a result of the annual drive, have until recently been slow coming in, but now have almost equalled the amount given last year.

The increased number of people using the House, and the range of activities suggests the distinctly promising influence the Community House has upon the residents of Birmingham, Mrs. Lally reports.

Outstanding programs have already been lined up for next fall, with particular interest centered in the planned series of lectures by Prof. Preston Slosson, of the University of Michigan.

Continuing an event that has proved successful in the past two years, the Community House will reveal its newcomers' reception next fall. These have been extremely popular, introducing as they do the newer residents of Birmingham to the older citizens of the community.

Coordination of activity will help in making room for Mrs. Lally asks that organizations check with the Community House before setting important dates. This will eliminate conflicting meetings where several persons belong to two organizations, or where space in the House will not permit two meetings of the same size being held.
