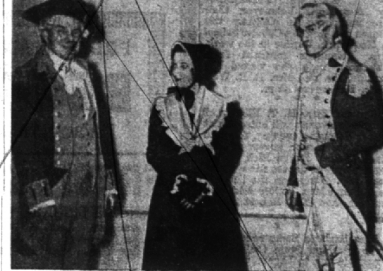
MAJOR DONNELLY TO ADDRESS CLUB

GUEST DESCRIBES EXPERIENCES IN CENTERS OF WAR

Mrs. Arthur O'Neil appeared before Monday's meeting of the League of Catholic Women as guest of honor and principal speaker. With Mr. O'Neil, she is visiting in and Mrs. Henry M. Foley of Madison avenue, following several years of residence in Spain. Mr. O'Neil is Mrs. Foley's brother.

The couple were living in Barcelona when the Spanish Civil War broke out and their experiences were brought vividly before the League in Mrs. O'Neil's talk. From the balcony of her home, overlooking Barcelona's principal street, the speaker was eye-witness to the fighting. Later, she told how she joined a party of women and children who were taken to Marseilles by a British gunboat.

Mr. O'Neil came to the United States from Hamburg. She sketched a few of her experiences in the German city and told how she willfully pretended to have no understanding of the German language.

"No one talks very much over there," she said, "and I wanted to avoid complications."

Her morning tea followed the program. The table resembled an old-fashioned Valentine, with a lace cloth, entwined with red lips and matching tapers. The next meeting of the League will be held at the home of Mrs. W. R. Hans. The meeting will start with a pot-luck sandwich luncheon.
