Vegetable Croquettes
Leftover carrots, turnip, beans and peas make tasty croquettes when combined with beaten eggs. 1 tablespoon flour and a generous amount of chopped parsley, chopped parsley and garnish with. Serve very hot with fresh parsley.

Creamed Shrimp
Heat 1 cup of shrimp in 1 cup of rich cream sauce. When ready to serve, add 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley and garnish with slices of hard boiled egg.

Raw Vegetable Salad
1 cup finely chopped green pepper.
1 cup grated raw carrots.
1 cup finely shredded lettuce.
1 1/2 pound American cheese, grated—mayonnaise.
Mix each vegetable separately with enough mayonnaise to bond. On a leaf of lettuce place a mound of carrot. Place a mound of lettuce on top of carrots and top with a mound of green pepper, sprinkle with cheese. Serve with savory dressing.

Celery and Olive Stuffing
2 tablespoons of celery.
2 cups soft bread crumbs.
1 teaspoon salt.
2 cups of finely chopped celery.
1/2 cup chopped stuffed olives.
1/4 teaspoon pepper.
Wash and cut celery, salt and pepper and mix thoroughly. Use for stuffing roast shoulder of pork.

Currant Mint Sauce
2 tablespoons chopped nuts.
2 tablespoons chopped mint leaves.
1 glass currant jelly.
Mash jelly with a fork. Add nuts and mint leaves and mix well. Serve as a relish with roast lamb.

Dinner Punch
Four 1 cup of strong green tea over 1 tablespoon finely chopped mint. Add 1/4 cup of lemon juice, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup sugar syrup, a few grains of salt and the rind from 1 cucumber, cut in strips. Let stand until cool. Strain and chill just before serving pour into a lemonade jug half full of ice. Add 1 pint of honeyberry juice, grapefruit and carbonated water. Garnish with a sprig of mint, thin slices of orange and lemon.

Mint Glazed Carrots
3 medium sized carrots.
1/2 cup butter.
1/2 cup sugar.
1 tablespoon chopped mint leaves.
1 cups cooked peas.
Butter, salt, pepper.
Cook carrots in salted water. Drain. Cook slowly with butter, sugar and mint leaves until soft and glazed. Add peas. Season with butter, salt and pepper.

Parsley Sandwiches
Cut halves of celery in fine pieces. Mash about half a pint of parsley and a slice of minced onion. Mix with a little mayonnaise and spread between buttered-slices of whole wheat bread.

Fashion Tips

SECRETS OF TIBET TO BE REVEALED BY EXPLORER

Thes. Bernard and Byron D. MacDonald, explorers, and Burton Holmes, globe-trotter, will be next week's World Adventure Series attractions at the DeSoto Institute.

At 8:30 next Sunday afternoon Thes. Bernard shows 1,500 feet of natural color movies to illustrate his "Tibet, the Penthouse of the Gods." At 8:30 the same evening MacDonald lectures on "Cruising Through Dalmatia, Greece and the Greek Isles," also with full color motion pictures.

Burton Holmes brings new motion pictures filmed last summer for his

"Along the Spanish Main" at 8:30 next Tuesday evening, February 21.

Thes. Bernard made his way across the muddy Brahmaputra and over snowbound Himalayan mountain passes into regions where no white man had previously explored. He was entertained by the King-Begent, himself, and allowed to visit secret lamasteries and to photograph strange ritualistic feats which were miraculous in nature. Bernard's story is the strangest ever brought back from Tibet, and his are the first Tibetan movies in full color.

MacDonald's color-camera cruise begins at Venice and visits the medieval little walled towns along the magnificent fjords of Dalmatia. He stops at colorful Ioman Isles, and goes to Athens, Delphi on Mount Parnassus, Corinth and many other beauty spots. Greece, Naxos, Samothrace, Delos and

Crete are among the Aegean Isles on his itinerary. He visits ancient Troy and Constantinople, and goes to Rhodes and other islands of the Eastern Mediterranean.
