Lamb Is A Favorite Stand-by With Housewives Who Take Pride In Cooking

There are many ways of serving lamb, which makes it a very satisfactory meat for the house-keeper. Slices from the neck or shoulder are good either served cold or heated in gravy. Lamb en casserole, lamb souffle, or lamb chops are a few ways of using left-overs.

Crown of Lamb
Select two pieces from loin of lamb and have butcher prepare for a crown roast. Fill the center with Hamburg steak mixture with chopped onion, mushrooms and cover with strips of bacon. Sear for 20 minutes in an oven 450 degrees, reduce heat to 300 degrees and roast for 2 hours or until tender. If desired, decorate sides of bone with paper frills. Garnish with potato balls and mint leaves. Serve with squash and mint rice.

Lamb Stew with Dumplings
2-1/2 lbs. forequarter of lamb
6 carrots cut in strips
1 small yellow turnip cut in cubes
8 small onions
2 teaspoons salt
1-4 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon sugar
6 potatoes cut in eights
Dumplings
Cut the meat in 2-inch cubes. Put in kettle, cover with boiling water and cook until tender. Add carrots, turnips, onions and seasoning. Cook until vegetables are tender. Thicken with a little flour mixed to a smooth paste with cold water. Use your favorite dumpling recipe. Drop dumplings on top of stew, cover closely and steam 15 or 20 minutes. Cooked noodles may be used instead of dumplings. Arrange on top of stew and simmer 5 to 10 minutes.

Salmi of Lamb
Cut cold roast lamb in thin slices. Cook 1-2 tablespoon of finely chopped onion in 2 tablespoons of fat for 5 minutes. Add lamb, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover with cold lamb gravy to which a few chopped olives have been added. Cook until thoroughly heated. Arrange slices of meat on platter, pour the sauce over and garnish with toast points.

Local Collection on 1938 Tax Rolls Closes Feb. 28, 1939
On Mar. 1st, in addition to the 3/4% added to all 1938 taxes on the 1st of each month, 4% is added to the 1938 city taxes.
For a period of about 6 weeks after Mar. 1st, the Delinquent Roll will be in process of preparation, and persons desiring to pay any 1938 taxes during this period must apply at the City Treasurer's Office for a certificate of the amount of such taxes. This certificate must then be presented with the payment to the County Treasurer at Pontiac.
