STATE OWNS MORE THAN 2,000,000 ACRES OF LAND

LANSING, Feb. 8.—State-owned land in Michigan has now reached a total of nearly 2,500,000 acres, a summary from the lands division of the department of conservation shows. The exact figure reported is 2,417,580 acres.

PONTIAC—No further action will be taken in the one-man grand jury probe of alleged violations of the State fair-trade laws by Oakland County gasoline dealers and distributors until after George B. Hatrick, who heard the testimony, and Prosecutor Charles L. Wilson, have studied a decision of the Michigan Supreme Court handed down last week nullifying sections of the trade laws, they announced.

ROYAL OAK—William Willingham, 41, died of a heart attack at his home in Detroit, Feb. 10. He was in a car driven by Webster Campbell, 77, of 2212 Michigan avenue, Detroit, who was forced off the road and crashed into a grocery store. Willingham was taken to Sunnybrook Hospital with fractures of the left hip and leg.

WALLED LAKE—Dean McMillen, 38 years old, suffered first and second degree burns on the arm and shoulder when he fell into a pan of hot water at the Buffney slaughter house last Thursday. Mr. McMillen tripped and sat down in water at a lamp.
