The Maple Leaf-Set, Theresa game in the quarter finals of the State championship saw Fleming ham leading at the half, but losing in the end by one point. Nothing but one disappointment of the year.

The remarkable record of Breckford overhauled the loss of the State track crown in '38. Breaking records in nearly every race, running careers by setting new records in the Regional, State, and Mansfield meets. In the A. A. U. at Grand Rapids he was beaten for the first time by his brother and for the first time in his career he has never beaten in any race in high school. This year's record of another great Baldwin star.

Not to be overlooked is the performance of Captain Frank McCarthy. He topped the team with 17 points.

The '28 golf team was also the best team the Maple Leafs have ever had. This year's team is the first golf team to ever represent Baldwin in the State finals.

Robert H. Shaw added to his laurels by bringing the State individual medal play championship trophy to Birmingham for the first time.

In the match play the defeat of a highly touted Acorn squad was the highlight of the season. The play with Royal Oak was not decided until the final hole of the match and the final shot. To Warner Raynor goes the glory.

With the match tied and he himself all even going up the eighth hole, Warner needed this final hole for 2 1/2 points and the match. A par five 547 yard hole.

Warner was even with the pit, trapped on his second shot. With the outcome of the match depending on his explosion shot out of the trap he exploded to within one inch of the cup for a birdie four and the match.

The '38 baseball team finished a fairly successful season. Al Jones started out several games in the game he allowed but one hit and in another he struck out eighteen.
