

YOUNG ARTIST TO BE HEARD WITH ORCHESTRA

It will be a week of violinists for the orchestra, for at the third of the popular-priced concerts, Saturday night, Jan. 20, the soloist will be Viola Mitchell, gifted young American, who has won success on both sides of the Atlantic.

Miss Mitchell had an unusual career, playing a number of the foremost concertos with symphony orchestras before she was 19. She began her musical studies with a pupil of Joachim, Sevcik and Auer and at the age of 14 became the youngest and favorite pupil of Eugene Yaase in Brussels. She has appeared as soloist with the greatest symphony orchestras the world over. Miss Mitchell has chosen to play for Violin and Orchestra the Major Concerto of Saint-Saens.

No season of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra would seem to be complete without the appearance of the orchestra's popular concertmaster, Iva Schkolnik, as soloist.

Schkolnik will be soloist at the ninth subscription concert in Orchestra Hall, Thursday night, Jan. 26. He will play two complete concertos with the orchestra. These works, Tartin's Concerto in D Minor and Stravinsky's Concerto, are as sharply contrasting as any two major violin compositions can be and permit the qualified performer an opportunity to demonstrate all the details of fine violin playing.

"In Answer To Your Inquiry" ONE OF BERT MILLER'S friends, who is a cashier in a Michigan bank, found an article by some unknown writer, which tells an amusing story about what happened when some Eastern interests were considering the purchase of real estate in Louisiana. During the negotiations they write to the owners of the property, asking for an abstract of title, and in due course received what was certified to be a copy of the official records. Writing in reply, the prospective purchasers commented on the fact that the title record began with the year 1803 and stated that, while the title seemed to be complete and satisfactory as far as it went, still, as a justification for the investment of the sum under discussion, they would require to know more of the origin of the title as involved in the record back of 1803.

The Queen of Spain had verified her arrangement and received sanction of her title by consent of the pope, a resident of Rome, Italy, and ex-officio representative and vice-regent on behalf of Jesus Christ. "Jesus Christ was the son and heir-apparent of God. "God made Louisiana. "Trusting that this additional citation complies with your request and assuring you of our willingness to be of service, I am"

FISHING CENSUS GIVES REPORT ON STATE ANGLERS

LANSING, Jan. 18.—Reports from both expert anglers and just plain fishermen including more than a few "non-fishers" are now coming in to the fish division of the department of conservation in the wind up of creel censuses for 1938. Approximately 18,000 of the general creel census reports have been received to date. The number of returns from the special census is considerably smaller since only about 300 expert anglers were selected to participate. Information accumulated through the reports, including such facts as size and species of catches, where catches were made, weather conditions and time of fishing, is to be tabulated at the institute for fisheries research, the fact finding branch of the fish division. The information will provide a comparison of the success or lack of it, of both the expert and the fishermen who relies more on luck than on graduate techniques. The general census, of course, furnish pertinent information concerning fishing conditions throughout the state. The general census has been taken each year for more than a decade.

The anglers who are designated for the "expert" census are selected mostly by conservation officers. The general census, on the other hand, is made by the general public, officers, fish division workers and other employees of the department.

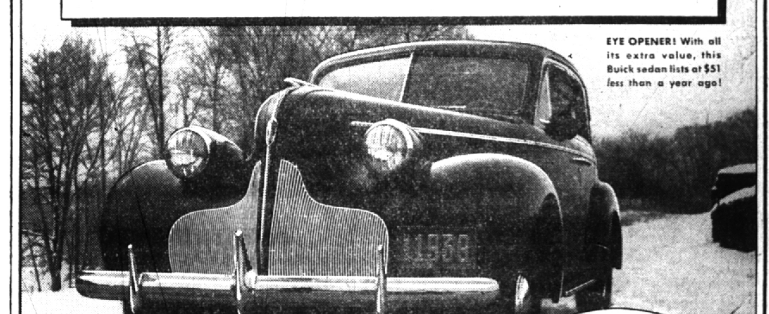
