BITS OF BIRMINGHAM

"East is east and west is west and never the twain shall meet" wrote Kipling years ago, but that was before Rotary Clubs began to grow all over the world. Monday, at the Birmingham Rotary Club's meeting at the Community House, Rotarian Glenn Russell, of Jersey City, New Jersey, and Rotarian W. Clarence Wright, of Los Angeles, were among the visitors.

City Commissioner E. Wilmer Moody, up to two weeks ago, had never seen Birmingham. Now, if you see him walking down the street rather aimlessly standing up against a building looking into space or any other manner of airy dreaminess, you can just bet he is "thinkin' about another fishin' trip." Over the weekend of July 8 the Commissioner and Mrs. Moody were guests of the Birmingham Rotary Club at Cedar Point. The host took Mr. Moody out in a cabin cruiser on Lake Erie at ten in the morning, returning at six; total catch was 31 pounds of pickerel, a goodly share of which Mr. Moody caught. In an effort to aid head property owners to help Birmingham "The Beautiful City" next year local officials may devise a plan to cut the weeds on every vacant lot in town, assessing the cost against the property. At present the city cuts weeds only between the sidewalk and curb. Many residents feel that nearby vacant property spreads weeds into their yards and gardens, and believe if every vacant lot were kept free of weeds, it would render a distinct practical service by elimination of every possible weed growth, especially weeds owned by absentee persons. A charge of from one to two dollars is the estimated cost in total which will be consumed in administrative expense.

CHURCH YOUTH

have been appreciated. Certain annual celebrations such as Halloween and Christmas have become traditions that are adventures in friendliness and cooperation in behalf of youth, says Miss Grether.

Full Programs Confusing However, she cautions that young people often are frustrated in achieving unified personalities by pressure of too many activities in the school and church, plus the other aesthetic and social groups in Birmingham. While each offers real values in itself, when taken all together they can prove confusing and disintegrating by their very profusion.

"A young person," continued Miss Grether, "born by conflicting loyalties, is under a tension which does not make for mental, physical or spiritual growth.

"Seasons such as Christmas and Easter, which should be times of spiritual growth and enrichment, are often seasons of strain and exhaustion instead."

Offers Solution to Problem As a solution to these conflicting programs, Miss Grether offered the suggestion that a Council be established which would represent the youth, parents, school, church and community, which would meet early in the year and map a program that would consider the other interests.

Then the conflicts between institutions that administer to youth could be reduced to a minimum and there would be a great improvement.

While Miss Grether believes some progress has been made in this type of cooperation, she feels that it could be made more specific and definite.

Youth Needs Convictions Asked what her feeling was toward the world of youth in general, Miss Grether replied that because there are so many conflicting ideologies in the world today, young people need more than opinions. They need convictions with intelligent reasons for them and a means of expressing them in a practical way. Speaking of the influence the church must exert in this direction, Miss Grether said, "I think the church is coming more and more to build its program around that objective."

"The church today needs to discover the faith by which it lives, as well as to discover the certain patterns of behavior. She needs to enrich the content of faith, as well as the method by which she expresses it. The united voice of a group such as the Madras International Christian Conference recognizes this fact."

What the effect of world events had on the church of today is remarkable, Miss Grether said. "Christians are more aware of their world citizenship as Christians, and are less denominational and sectional," she concluded.

Miss Grether is a graduate of Wooster College, where she specialized in Greek translation work. She has taken a three-year Bible study course at the Philadelphia Bible School, and has spent three summers at the Wooster, Presbyterian Summer Training School in the study of religious education.
