Figs are an ideal food in themselves. They are a splendid source of lime and iron, and are one food which contains a well-balanced ration of all food elements necessary to life. Therefore they should be served frequently. They are easiest peeled, sliced, sweetened and served with cream.

over it the batter, made as follows:
3 egg whites,
3/4 cup sugar,
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 egg yolks,
1/2 cup sugar,
1 cup flour,
1 teaspoon baking powder,
3 tablespoons orange juice,
1 grated orange rind,
Beat whites, add 3/4 cup sugar and flavoring. Beat yolks, add 3/4 cup sugar, baking powder and flour sifted twice, add orange juice to grated rind. Fold in egg white mixture carefully. Pour over mixture in skillet and bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Turn upside down and serve with whipped cream.

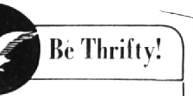
Fig Cocktail
Fill individual glasses half full of lemon ice. Finish filling the glasses with slices of figs.

Lemon Ice
Boil 1 cup of water and 1 cup of sugar 20 minutes. Let cool. Add 1/2 cup of lemon juice and reeze.

Fig Cup
1 pound washed figs,
4 tablespoons sugar,
2 teaspoons lemon juice,
1 cup wine,
Chopped salted pecans.
Stuff figs with pecans. Put the sugar, lemon juice and wine in a cuppan. When heated, add figs over and cover until figs are tender. Baste and turn often.

Fig Skillet Cake
1/2 cup brown sugar,
4 tablespoons butter,
2 cups canned figs,
5 cup pecans,
Melt butter in skillet, add the brown sugar, figs and nuts. Pour

1/2 teaspoon vanilla,
1 scant cup sugar.
Figs.
Beat egg whites, vanilla and lemon juice until like angel food cake batter. Fold in sugar and beat until very stiff. Run mixture into a pan 7 x 11, which has been rinsed with cold water. Bake in oven 275 degrees for 15 minutes. Top with whipped cream and sliced figs.

Fig Float
Lemonade with chopped pieces of fig topped with whipped cream. Serve in tall glasses.

Fig Parfait
Nut ice cream, chopped figs, whipped cream and maraschino cherries. Serve in parfait glasses.

Fig Preserves
Measure to each pound of figs 3/4 pound of sugar. Let stand several hours in sugar before cooking. Cook slowly until figs are transparent. Take out of syrup, fill jars. Allow syrup to boil to proper thickness. Pour over the figs and seal. If you like lemon, slice one in the syrup while boiling.

Branded Figs
4 pounds figs,
4 pounds sugar,
2 cups water,
2 inches vanilla bean.
Brandy.
Wash, soak and steam the figs for 20 minutes, make a syrup by boiling together the sugar and water; when the sugar is dissolved add the figs and cook until they are transparent. Set aside for 24 hours, then drain off the liquid, boil it down till very thick and add vanilla bean to it while cooking. When cold remove the vanilla. Measure and add an equal amount of brandy. Put the figs in jars, fill to overflowing with the syrup and seal at once.

Fig Meringue
4 egg whites,
1 teaspoon lemon juice.
