"Edgar Allan Poe" is to be produced this summer with Claude Rains in the title role. . . .

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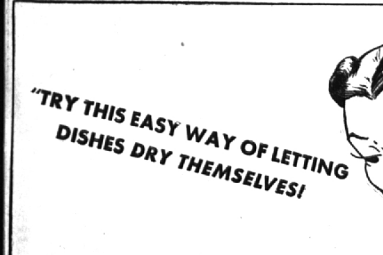
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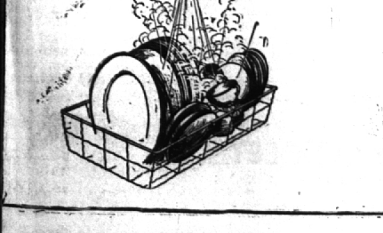
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- Peach Sundae**
1 quart milk.
1/2 pint cream.
3/4 cup sugar.
4 teaspoon salt.
15 teaspoons vanilla.
Scald the milk and pour some of it over the well-beaten eggs. Return to the double boiler and cook the milk and eggs with the sugar and salt until the custard coats the spoon.
Cool, add the cream and vanilla. Freeze. Serve sweetened crushed peaches over it.
- Coffee Parfait**
5/8 cup sugar.
1/2 cup strong coffee.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
2 eggs.
2 cups cream.
Salt.
Make coffee in the proportion of two tablespoons of coffee to 1 cup of water. Boil 1/2 cup of coffee with the sugar until it is a tea, given by Freeze. Serve sweetened crushed peaches over it.
- Caramel Ice Cream**
Caramelize 1/2 cup sugar till dark brown. Add 1 quart of milk and 1/2 cup of sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Cool and add 1 cup of cream to mixture. Freeze in the usual manner.
- Pineapple Orange Ice Cream**
Combine 1 cup crushed pineapple, the juice of 2 oranges, juice of 1/2 lemon and 1 cup cream. Stand 1/2 hour to blend flavors. Add 4 cups of milk and 1 cup of cream. Freeze.
- Fresh Peach Ice Cream**
2 cups crushed fresh peaches.
2 cups sugar.
2 cups thin cream.
Crush the peaches with a silver fork, add the sugar, let stand until the sugar has dissolved. Stir in the cream gradually. Chill and freeze.
- Chocolate Ice Cream**
1 cup milk.
2 cups sugar.
2 eggs.
2 squares chocolate.
1/4 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 cup cream.
1 cup heavy cream.
Salt.
Scald milk and sugar together
- Banana Ice Cream**
1/2 cup evaporated milk.
4 teaspoon gelatin.
2 teaspoons cold water.
1/2 cup banana pulp.
1/2 cup confectioner's sugar.
1/4 cup maraschino cherries.
1 teaspoon lemon juice.
1 egg white.
Scald evaporated milk over hot water. Soak gelatin in the cold water for 5 minutes and dissolve in the scalded milk. Chill. Combine the banana pulp, sugar, chopped cherries and 1/2 cup of the lemon juice. Chill. Add 1 teaspoon lemon juice to the chilled milk. Add the egg white and milk into banana mixture. Freeze.
- Peppermint Lime Ice Cream**
Dissolve 1 package of lime-flavored gelatin in 1 1/2 cups of water. When slightly thickened, fold in 2 cups of whipped cream and 3/4 cup of broken peppermint candy. Freeze.
- Maple Nut Ice Cream**
1 cup maple syrup.
1/2 cup sugar.
2 1/2 cups milk.
1 cup chopped nuts.
1 1/2 cups cream.
1 egg white.
Mix thoroughly and freeze.
- Cafe Parfait**
Fill parfait glasses two-thirds full of vanilla ice cream; over the ice cream pour 2 tablespoons of coffee sauce and fill the remainder of the glass with whipped cream. Decorate with one maraschino cherry and nut meats.
- Coffee Sauce**
To 1 cup of strong coffee, add 1 tablespoon of sugar, reduce to 1/2 cup by boiling.
- Peach Macaroni Ice Cream**
Scald 2 cups of milk. Beat 1 cup, add 1/2 cup of sugar and add scalded milk. Return all to double boiler and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add 1 cup of ripe macaroni, crushed and cooled. Add 1 cup of peach pulp and 1 cup of cream whipped. Freeze.

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
